DEER, DUCK AND DOVE HUNTING SEASON SOON

In only a few more days the fields and forests of Texas where wild game make their homes will be invaded by thousands of sportsmen in quest of shooting. New laws have been made covering the taking of the various types of game to be found in Texas and during the past two seasons there has been confusion as to shooting regulations and bag limits.

Conflicting regulations between state and federal laws covering the taking of migratory water fowl and bag limits have existed for the past two years. State regulations will be enforced.

Wild duck, with the exception of wood, ruddy, canvasback, redhead and buffhead, may be shot in Texas from November 26 to December 25. The open season on geese, brant, and jacksnipe is concurrent with the duck season. To hunt migratory water fowl it will be necessary to obtain a migratory water fowl stamp, which costs \$1 and may be obtained at the post office or any sporting goods store. It will also be necessary to place guns to a three-shell capacity. The bag limit on ducks is 10 and on geese including brant, four any day, and no more than one day's limit may be had in possession at any one time.

The mourning dove season in the South Texas zone will run concurrently with the quail law which allows hunting from December 1 to January 15. It will not be necessary to obtain a duck stamp to hunt mourning doves but the federal government has then classed as a migratory bird and your gun must be plugged to the three-shell limit. The bag limit on doves is 15 a day and not more than 45 a week.

While the open season on quail runs concurrent with the mourning dove season, it will not be necessary to plug your gun to shoot quail.
