ERADICATION OF RANG'S DISEASE IS DISCUSSED

(By W. H. Young, County Agent)

A number of producers have requested information relative to the control of Bangs Disease, by the Government. First, they are restricting the work mainly to their herds and breeding herds of best cattle.

In order to get this work done and secure pay for the reactors, the county agent has a few of these contracts in the office but to date no producer has signed the agreement. We can not mail out these contracts to the producers until they have sufficient contracts for eight producers. Other copies can be secured if you are interested.

The county agent would like to see this work started in Colorado county. However, the terms of the contract are such as to make it almost impossible, at least not practical for certain producers, therefore we prefer that the interested producers come to the office and read the contract and then if they desire we will be glad to aid in any way to have this work done.

To quote M. L. Darby, inspector in charge: "It is our policy to let only herds of a permanent nature such as dairy and breeding herds who desire to clean up and stay with the program."

The three hunters were ignorant of their close proximity to the savages—were quickly preparing their dinner of venison, when well armed arrows pierced and killed young Alroy and Loy. John Clark, although badly wounded, ran to the river and swam to a place of safety in Wharton. He recovered from his
