## Patteson Is New C. OF C. PLANS OUTSTANDING Tax Group To District Judge

#### B.C. Schraub Named DA

E. W. Patteson, of Gonzales, former district attorney for the 25th Judicial District ncluding Colorado, Lavaca, Suadalupe, and Gonzales Counties was appointed Tues., Dec. 29th, as judge of the Second 25th Judicial District by Texas Governor Preston

Patteson, whose appoint-ment became effective Jan. I, 1971, succeeded Judge Willis Ellison, Judge Ellison retired Dec. 31 after 42 years in public life.

B. B. Schraub, the county judge of Guadalupe County and a resident of Seguin, was appointed by Gov. Smith to succeed Patteson as District At-

Patteson received a telegram Tuesday of last week informing him of the governor's choice.

Mr. Patteson had served as district attorney since the county attorney, taking office in 1951.

He received his law degree from Baylor University after graduating from Southwest Texas State University and attending the University of Tends at Austin. Schraub; the new D. A.,

# Shows Garbage

A recent survey made by the City of Eagle Lake of the garbage cans in-use at residences and businesses in the community shows an excessive amount of containers that do not meet the standards. Many of the metal containers have badly rusted bottoms and no handles which makes it difficult for the sanitation personnel to empty.

City officials point out that Section 2 of the garbage ordinance passed 12 years ago reads in part: "That it shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing, or renting any premise...to provide a portable garbage can, or a sufficient number of portable containers, with two handles and a tight fitting cover or lid, of a capacity of not less than duty....to place in boxes,

5 gallons nor more than 30 gallons ... it shall also be the sacks, barrels, or other reasonable size, provided that the gross weight,...does not exceed 100 pounds; Garbage cans, boxes, sacks, barrels or other receptacles of trash and rubbish, and tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding 4 feet) shall be placed....inside the curb line of a street or back of the ditch to be collected by City collecting vehicles."

# Year Olds May **Register To Vote**

Colorado County Tax.Officer Henry J. Hajovsky has received word from Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. that 18, 19, and 20 year olds may vote in federal elections and those persons interested in registering must apply at his office in Columbus.

Mr. Dies pointed out in his tetter that although there are no federal elections scheduled in the voting year 1971, there is the possibility of a special election to fill a vacuncy in a federal office.

The county tax officer was authorized to issue registration certificates to all applicants 18, 19, and 20 years of age and to those persons who are not yet 18, but will be 18 before March I, 1972. For persons in this category the voter registration ertificates should have stamped or written in red ink across the face of the certificate, "Federal Elections-Only Until 21 Years of Age, Birthdate -

The secretary of state said, "The birthdate is now a necessity since a person becomes eligible to vote in federal clettons on on date and in state and local elections on another date. The space on the certificate 'not entitled to vote until- should be filled with the 18th birthday of the applicant if he is not already, 18 years of age."

Applications for voting, for any age person, must be filed with the County Ten Office: in Eagle Lake before midnight Sunday, Jan.
