REP. JUNGMICHEL SEES TOUGH ROAD FOR SCHOOL FINANCING

Speaks To EL Lions Last Thurs.

State Representative Char-lie Jungmichel, speaking be-fore the Eagle Lake Lions Club last Thursday, told his audience that the govern-ment of the people is only as strong as the people who elect rep-resentatives to office. He said, "We cannot completely disrupt government because of a few."

He admitted that some Tex-ans have "lost faith" with state government, but added that there are still a lot of honest and dedicated individ-uals in state government. "Honesty and integrity come from the inner soul of a man," added the representative.

He discussed the Lions and guests some of the leg-islative problems that are fac-ling the Texas Legislature. "Major among these is the financing the education of our youth," said Rep. Jungmichel.

He estimated that recent rulings by the courts that put a big question mark on ad valorem taxes, could mean an additional cost of \$1 billion for the next biennium.

"The people of this state just are not prepared for such a decision at this time and I can't see how they can ex-pect us to raise funds without an ad valorem tax."

Jungmichel is a regional chairman on the House Educa-tion Committee and he said that meetings will begin soon in an effort to solve the prob-lem of school financing for the next biennium.

He said that the special ses-sion expected to be called this

Market Report

All classes of cattle sold steady to strong at Columbus last Thursday. The demand was good. Packer cows sold \$1 to \$1.50 higher with stock-ers cows selling from \$1 to \$3 higher.

Good to choice butcher cal-ves sold 32 to 36 and year-lings 32 to 35.5; heiferlet packer cows sold 23 to 29; commercial packer bulls brought 23 to 31.

Heavy Hereford and Angus steer calves went from 35 to 45 and yearlings 33 to 40; crossbred steer calves sold 34 to 43 and yearlings 30 to 38. Good stocker cows and heifers brought \$190 to \$275 per head and 28 to 36 cents per pound.
