For the second time the riders will ride on Saturday from the Kokonut Grove to Oakland and will set up camp near the New Bielau Hall Saturday night, There will be a dance at the Kokonut Grove at 8:00 p.m. Friday night, -

Participants in the ride must register Friday night or Saturday morning at the Kokonut Grove Camp Site, A breakfast will be served for the riders Saturday morning for \$1,00 per person at the

Kokonut Grove. The annual trail ride barbecue and dance will be an event of Saturday, Feb. 5th at the New Bielau Hall, The Pearl Brewing Company will the trail riders for a party from 3:30 to 5:30 fr.m. Saturday. A barbecus supper will be served at the New Bielau Hall beginning at 6:00 p.m. Registered trail riders will be admitted free, all others will be charged \$1,50 per person. "It has been my privilege to serve Colorado County as County Judge since January I, 1971, when I succeeded Judge Willard Shuart by appointment, Since that time I have worked in close harmony with the County Commissioners in taking care of County government, and with the County Attorney, the Sheriff and other law enforcement officers in

enforcing the laws of our State, "The real challenge in the office of County Judge is the administration of County government, The County Judge serves as a voting chairman of the Commissioners' Court and thereby must accept the responsibility of aiding the Commissioners' Court in its

"I believe in getting a dollar's worth of value out of every tax dollar through proper spending and accounting, I have learned the importance of this as both a taxpayer and a former member of the Garwood and Rice Consolidated school boards.

"I constantly strive for quality service and fair and impartial justice to all, This has always been my belief in serving on boards where there were decisions to be made involving public funds and individuals' rights. My decisions have always been based on what I felt was good for the majority of the people and I have never let the pressure of some individual or small group influence my thinking.

Die In Tragedy

Three persons were killed and a 4-year-old boywas serlously injured in a tragic twocar accident on Highway 71 3.8 miles south of Columbus at 4:30 p.m. Monday of this

Highway Patrolman Billy Miller reported that his investigation showed that the accident occurred on a rain slick highway near the new bulk plant on High-

A 1967 Plymouth being driven south on Highway 71 by John Allen Rutta, 17, apparently went out of control on the rain-slick pavement and the car skidded across the pavement and struck a 1968 Rambler being driven north on Highway 71 by Mrs. Linda Walter Phillips of Austin.

The Rutta car crashed into the side of the Phillips car just belind the front door, said Killed instantly in the crash

Miss Linda Rutta, 16, sister of John Allen Rutta. John Allen was rushed to

Columbus Hospital by ambu-lance but he died en route to the hospital. Mrs. Phillips four year old son, James Gray Phillips, re-

ceived serious injuries and was taken to Columbus Hospital and later transferred to St. David's Hospital in Austin. He is expected to re-COVET. The two deceased teenagers

were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Dominic H. Rutta who reside just south of Columbus on Highway 71. They are also survived by a sister and one brother and other relatives and friends. Funeral services were held

for the sister and brother at 2:00 p.m. Wed., Feb. 2 from the First Baptist Church in Columbus with the Untermeyer - Henneke Funeral Home in charge of arrangements. Interment was in the Odd Fellows Rest Cemetery in Columbus.

The body of Mrs. Phillips was taken to Austin for services and burial in that city. She is survived by her husband, Tom Phillips, and a son.

City Employees Schedule In Given Pay **Increases**

Eagle Lake City Council, in regular session on Tuesday night of last week, approved pay increases averaging 3.4 per cent for city employees but voted not to participate in a proposed uniform program. As of February Ist, the

effective date for the new pay order, city salaries totaled \$6,670.00. Under the new pay scale the monthly salaries will total \$6905,00 or an average increase of \$14.70 for the eity's sixteen employees. City Manager T. J. Smith

noted to the council that eleven of the city regular employees have now been with the city for an average of five years and eleven months. The council approved the pay hikes after consideration of the constantly rising costs of living.

The council discussed a plan to put employees of the city into uniforms on a participating basis. However, after some discussion of the matter the council decided not to participate in the program. The council did however of-fer to set up a plan for payment of uniforms from employees' salaries if the employees decided to obtain uniforms on their own initiative.
