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Jury Favors SP RR in Horton Case

A six-member jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant Southern Pacific Railroad Company in a suit filed by the Horton and Horton gravel company and heard Tuesday last week and ended with a verdict at around 9:45 p.m.

The case went to trial Tuesday last week and ended with a verdict at around 9:45 p.m.

In the suit the Horton and Horton company alleged that it had a large stockpile of sand, estimated at 200,000 cubic yards, on some property that was condemned for railroad right-of-way in 1946. The gravel company estimated the land at 41.40 per cubic yard and asked for damages for the gravel company's railroad company built railroad across the condemned property.

County Judge Lester J. Cranek presided at the trial. Serving on the jury were Milton J. Kasterliser, Richard Bryant, Mrs. Kathleen Basse, Barbara Ann Simmons, Miss Hattie Lee Wilson, and Gladys Beyer.

The decision of the jury reportedly denied the gravel company's claim to damages in excess of a quarter million dollars.

Sen. Moore Favors Piecemeal Revision of Texas Constitution

State Senator William T. (Bill) Moore of Bryan, who won state re-election in the nineteen county Fifth District of Texas, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Noon Lions last Thursday.

The senator told the Lions and guests that he favored the piecemeal approach to the constitution revision rather than a complete revision all at one time.

"Voters in Texas will have an opportunity in the general election to vote on whether the state legislator should be called into the next session as a constitution revision," he said. "I would not like removed."

He stressed the importance of the "pay as you go" system of state financing. Among the guests present were Mayor Elmer Struss, City Manager T. J. Smith, Sheriff Fred R. Franks, D. R. Winterman, Sgt. E. A. Krivacka.

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Texas Rice Promotion Meet Feb. 10

Two prominent members of the rice industry will report on the rice situation in Korea, Japan and several other Far East countries at the annual meeting of the Texas Rice Promotion Association February 10 in Houston.

The speakers will be J. P. Gaines of Washington, D. C., Executive Vice President of the Rice Millers' Association, and W. W. Mauritz, Canada, President of the El Campo Rice Milling Company and immediate past president of the Rice Millers' Association.

M. W. Mauritz, Canada, President of the TRPA, urges Texas rice producers and their wives to attend the meeting. Coffee will be served at 10:00 a.m. at the Shamrock Hotel, Convention Center and the meeting will follow.

Gaines and Mauritz were members of an RMA sponsored team which recently visited several Asian nations and were instrumental in the culmination of the Korean sales agreement which is expected to move approximately 800,000 metric tons of American rice to that country this year. These expected sales are credited by many industry officials as being responsible for restoration of the 10% rice acreage cut made in 1971. They will discuss highlights of their findings and will present a film taken during their travels.

The meeting will also include reports from members of the staff of the Rice Council for Market Development, of which the Texas group is the state affiliate. Rice Council Executive Vice President L. O. Tiedt will review rice promotion efforts, problems and plans.
