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There are two important art award contests in which Rice High School art students will be competing. One is the Houston Spring Art Festival in April. Nine of our students have entered the Scholastic Art Awards program which is now in progress. This program is conducted nationally by Scholastic Magazines, Incorporated.

Mary Toliver has entered an oil painting and a pencil drawing. Annette Hengst submitted a self portrait of mixed media and an apparel design. Beatrice Korenek added a sculpture scene carved from styrofoam; Henry Thomas entered a mixed media picture of tissue paper and ink; Dennis McClain submitted two ink drawings; Debbie Roch has entered one acrylic painting, one mixed media painting, and one graphic design which was an advertising illustration. Mary English also had a graphic design which was a lining illustration. Roger Clark added a textile design which was a bookend rug, and macramé wall hanging. Mary Toliver also had a graphic design which was a lining illustration.

This is the forty-fifth year of the national Scholastic Art Awards program. The purpose is to promote student achievement in the visual arts. The award classifications cover the fields of painting, drawing, printmaking, three-dimensional art, and photography. National honors are scholarships, gold medals, cash awards, and the honor of display at the National High School Art Exhibition in New York.

Students in grades 7 through 12 regularly and currently enrolled in public, private, or parochial schools are eligible, as well as any student over age 18.

All entries are required to be original. The judges for Scholastic Art Awards are educators and artists who have an understanding of art education on the secondary school level. They are recommended by the Advisory Committee of art educators. Decisions of the regional and national judges will be final.

Results of the contestants who will remain in the contest should arrive soon to Fred Graham, principal.

Another upcoming contest which Rice High School students will be involved in is the Houston Post Spring Art Festival. This contest is in its 32nd year. It is for the benefit of young people in the 30-county area surrounding Houston. Last year 3,800 entries were judged. This year the Houston Post has made more awards available. The Post Portfolio Scholarship for a graduating senior is increased to \$200.00 and there will be special awards - a first prize from business and art-associated organizations.

Miss Susan Clarry of Beaumont was last year's winner of the Houston Post Portfolio Scholarship, which consisted of \$150.00. She entered the Festival as a senior in Forest Park High School, Beaumont, and is now continuing her art education at Lamar University in Beaumont.
