Southern Corn Leaf Blight Is Damaging

Southern corn leaf blight is a bit about southern corn leaf blight. Last year we tested quite a bit about southern corn leaf blight. Why did we have the large corn crop we produced? Producers expected the virus disease to damage a sizable portion of the crop, so they planted extra acreage. Low humidity and lower than average summer temperatures through the corn belt did not allow the virus disease to get started on a large scale until the crop had made. cytoplasm. Susceptible seed may or may not be identified as "T-cytoplasm." With the use of normal-cytoplasm seed, Southern corn leaf blight should be of little economic importance in the future.

Start Summer Flowering Annuals Indoors

"Get the jump" on spring by starting your summer-flowering annuals indoors. Common flower bedding plants such as petunias, calceolarias, map-dragnes and others, which grow slowly when temperatures are low. Furthermore, marigolds, tinias, calceolarias and certain other flowers cannot be transplanted until the first of May. Frost has passed. Strong winds are blowing. The plants are growing. They are ready to be transplanted. They should be transplanted in the garden when they are almost ready to flower and the danger of a killing frost is past. Two methods for starting plants indoors may be used. One involves the use of a seed flat in which vermiculite, perlite or coarse sand is used as a planting media. Or potting soil may be used with 1/2 or 3/4 inch covering of one of the above materials. Fruit boxes, pans or trays may be used to start plants. They should be three to six inches deep and have openings in the bottom for drainage. Soak the planting media thoroughly, then remove surplus water by squeezing or draining. Open tiny furrows 1/4 inch deep two inches apart. Distribute seed 1/4 to 1/2 inch apart in these furrows and level the surface. Cover the seed flat with clear plastic bag, using small wire hoops to hold the plastic off the young seedlings. Place flat in sunny window. If plants begin to grow, they will be ready to transplant in the garden. If the plastic is removed suddenly, the seedlings will die due to the drastic change in humidity. Keep the plants in this condition until they can safely be planted outdoors. Seedling plants can also be produced by planting two to five seeds directly into the small containers in which they are to grow. The depth of planting, watering, management and covering with plastic is much the same as when planted in seed flats or trays. A 20 cent packet of seed can produce an abundance of color in your flower border, planter or window box.

Investment Tax Credit Restored

Investment tax credit is back. Farmers, ranchers and businessmen can claim a seven percent investment tax credit on their 1971 tax returns for qualifying property. Such property must have been ordered and acquired after March 31, 1971, or acquired after August 15, regardless of when ordered, acquired, or placed in service. James I. Mallory, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Investment credit also applies to property where construction or reconstruction was begun after March 31 or was completed after August 15. Regardless of when begun, if construction was begun before April 1, only costs attributed to the period after August 15 apply, explains Mallory. Investment credit must be taken the year the property is placed in the service and cannot exceed your tax liability, says the economist. If the tax liability is greater than \$25,000, the limit is \$25,000 plus one-half of the tax liability in excess of \$25,000. Unused credit can be carried back over seven years and then forward seven years. The amount of investment credit on each asset depends on its useful life. This must be the same for computing both investment credit and depreciation. One-third of the investment qualifies for tax credit if the useful life is three years but less than five years; two-thirds, if five years but less than seven; and 100 percent, if seven years or more. There is a \$50,000 limitation on investment credit in used property eligible for credit. Property qualifying for investment tax credit must be depreciable, points out Mallory. It includes tangible personal business property such as machinery, office equipment, trucks, autos and, for the first time, livestock (except horses), elevators and escalators. Tangible real property held closely to production is also included, such as fences, silos, grain bins, hay barns and fuel storage tanks. Buildings not used strictly for storage do not qualify. Foreign-made equipment is not eligible for tax credit unless it was ordered between April 1 and August 15 last year. This included all property completed outside the United States and property completed in this country if less than 50 percent of the cost is attributable to value added inside the U.S.
