exceed the pay of the county tax officer. The judges rec-

ommended that the pay of the

county auditor be \$10,263.60

and increase the pay of the

assessor by \$1,000.00 from

\$26,275.75 to \$26,982.00.

Only other deviations from

the five per cent increase

were made in approving an in-

crease from \$21,672.02 to \$23120

for the deputys for the distric-

tal attorney and \$1,000.00 for

eight special deputies for

the sheriff's office from

\$26.50 per month to \$40 per

month.

After salary and deputy

schedule was approved, an

order was issued for the sheriff

to reduce the number of special depu-

ties from eight to six as

vacancies occurred in this cate-

gory.

Pay for additional help in

county offices, especially in

the tax office, was set at the

minimum of \$18.80 per hour or

\$14.40 per day, instead of

\$12.60 per day; and the allow-

ance for using personal cars

on county business was in-

creased from 10¢ to 12¢ per mile but the \$50 limit per

month was retained.

The commissioners approved

the use of five automobiles

for operation of the

sheriff's office and for

traffic control, and another

for night patrol functions, for

a total of seven cars.

certified.

In other matters before the board, Supt. Krivacka reported that work has been completed by contractor J. L. Drymalla on repairing a wall at the Middle School gym at a cost of around \$300. Also the floor has been refinished and the gym is now in top shape reported the superintendent.

Consideration was given to repairing several leaks in the roof of the gym.

**REPORT ON CONFERENCE**

\* Supt. Krivacka and Assistant Supt. Charles DesMazio reported on activities of the mid-winter conference of Texas School Administrators. Supt. Krivacka reported on sessions which he attended including ones on Workman's Compensation, School Financing and Transportation, and the all the committee reports.

Mr. DesMazio reported on sessions on career education, certification of teachers, on administration, the quarter system and other topics. He commented that the Rice CISD adult education program is one of the best in this region with a total of 70 enrolled. He told the board that we were in the middle of the year and attendance was good but that he was well satisfied with the way the program is working out.

The board approved a special transportation contract with the Texas Education Agency. The agency will pay \$150 to the school for a portion of the transportation of students in wheelchairs to and from classes.

Some discussion was held on the school program and the youth of the district and board members agreed that the programs, including night baseball for the boys in Little League, Babe Ruth and Connie Mack should continue until the new school year begins much worse. Leaders in the programs will be urged however to use schedules to use as little lighting as possible to conserve energy.

**OPEN MEETINGS**

\* The new regulations of the open meetings which is now in effect were discussed. It was noted that items that are not on the agenda may not be legally discussed at the meeting. The board also voted to make only those delegations who may request prior to the posting of the agenda on the basis of the items in the agenda be compensated by the county.

The action to approve the same came after Judge Cranek outlined provisions that the county would be compensated on the basis of the items in the agenda which is now in effect.
