

G. C. Herefords Average \$1,020 at Columbus Sale

Bull For \$1,800

The Gulf Coast Hereford Association held its 24th Annual Spring Sale in Columbus on Friday, February 8, 1974. The sale was conducted by the J.D.Q. Hereford Association. Total sales were \$1,020. Fifty-six bulls brought a total of \$55,147.00 making an average of \$1,020.00 and three bred females sold for \$1,800.00 for an average of \$600.00.

The remaining single bull was a junior yearling consigned by the J.D.Q. Hereford Farm of Burton, and he was bought by Mahalite Bros. of Eagle Lake for \$1,800.00.

The remaining single bull was a junior yearling consigned by the Hartstack Hereford Farm of Washington. This bull sold for \$1,725.00 to Stoney Hill of Raywood.

The remaining single bull

was consigned by Roger H. Hermann of Caldwell. L. A. Huber of Bellville bought both of the bulls at a price of \$1,400.00 each. This was the top selling pen of bulls.

The second pen of bulls

consisted of three senior yearlings consigned by the Rocking X Ranch of Burton. One of the bulls went to the K. A. Ranch of Victoria for \$1,350.00 and the other two to L. W. Marshall, who is also from Victoria, and M. Cresswell and Sheridan paid \$925.00 for the third bull in this pen.

The top selling entry in the sale was a spring yearling bull consigned by the J.D.Q. Hereford Farm of Burton, which sold for \$2,075.00 to L. B. Griffith of Port Lavaca.

The Hartstack Hereford Farm of Washington sold three heifers that had been pasture exposed to the reserve single bull of the sale.

These were junior yearling heifers, and the first two, Hockley, paid \$600.00 for one and \$590.00 for another, and Raymond David of East Bernard took the third heifer for \$560.00.

Farm Bureau Asks 'Hands Off' Farm Exports

The Texas Farm Bureau is urging President Nixon to consider a resolution to resist any efforts to place restrictions on farm exports.

A resolution adopted by the TFB Board of Directors this week and sent to the President and the House of Representatives as delegation in Congress states that "agricultural exports are absolutely essential to farmers and ranchers and are vitally important to the nation as a whole."

The resolution said that "embargoes placed on any commodities are invitations to economic disaster."

Part of the resolution says:

"Farm exports are a prime part of our foreign exchange and have helped give us a favorable balance of trade for the first time since 1970."

As important as the exports are to our overseas markets, the TFB resolution urges Congress that the President and Congress resist any efforts to restrict farm exports."

Colorado County Farm Bureau was represented by W. J. Brunner of Eagle Lake at a regional membership kickoff meeting February 13th at the Sherrill Inn in San Antonio. Mr. Brunner, Chairman of the County Farm Bureau Membership Committee.

The meeting in San Antonio was one of three such rallies of Farm Bureau membership workers held in Texas during the week of February 11-15, the period designated by Governor Dolph Briscoe as "Farm Bureau Membership Week in Texas."

At the meeting, the Texas Farm Bureau set a statewide goal of 170,000 member families in 1974. If this goal is met, every county Farm Bureau which shows a gain will receive an expense-free trip for its president to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting in New Orleans in January, 1975.

Colorado County Farm Bureau ended its 1973 year with 1089 member families. It was one of 200 county Farm Bureaus showing a gain last year.
