Postage Rates Going Up Sat.

Postage, like almost everything else, is slated to rise sharply this Saturday, Mar. 2nd when the Postal Service begins charging new rates approved by the Cost of Living Council. The rate hike was originally scheduled to begin January 1st but was postponed by the Council until Mar. 2.

Beginning Saturday, the 8c first class letter will require 10c; the six-cent postcard will cost 8c; and the 11-cent airmail letter will go up to 13c.

Compensation for 1974 will apply to second-class matter such as newspapers and third class mail which includes circulars, etc.

The hike will be approximately 36% for newspapers and over 25% for circulars. The per piece circular rate will increase from 4.8c to 6.1c.

The U. S. Postal Service says these rate hikes are necessary to reduce an operating deficit expected to be \$1.5 billion for 1974.

Mail postponed before midnight Fri., March will still go at the present rate.
