would also be a FM radio channel for constant music. He said the cost to the individual customer would be \$6.95 per month and for each additional outlet in a home or business there would be a \$1.50 charge for additional outlets.

For a franchise, the City of Eagle Lake would receive a sum in the amount of 3% of gross receipts twice a year for franchise. For this fee the company would be permitted to install cable TV systems and to use city alleys, streets, etc. wherever needed. The firm would also contract with other utilities for use of their poles wherever possible and if underground utilities are made, the representative said that the cable TV would also go underground.

The council is expected to take the matter under advisement and the council and Mayor Struss will appreciate your comments on the possible installation of cable television in this city.

In other action the council gave final approval to arrangements and contracts for the Ridgeles Addition where contractors are at work on

streets, curb and guttering and in laying utility lines.

Dr. Ray Thomas, president of the Eagle Lake Development Co., said that he was real happy with the progress being made. City Manager T. J. Smith reported that the contractors have been doing some good work to date.

Richard Oldmixon, manager for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., met with the council for further discussion on the company's request for a rate increase. He reported on income for business and residential services and explained methods used in deriving at figures used in computing the firm's rate of profit in this exchange.

No action was taken on the proposal and the matter is due to come up for more council consideration at the March 12th session.

## Adkins and Theuman Wells To Be Drilled

Two new oil and gas drilling-sites have been slated in this area on Adkins and Theuman land.

The No. 1 R. G. Adkins will be drilled to 9,500 feet in the North Chesterville Field by Davis Oil Co. of Houston two miles east of Eagle Lake. The site is on a 160-acre lease in the GH&R RR Survey 27, A-251.

The other location is two miles south of Eagle Lake and is the No. 1 Miles Theuman, projected to 2,900 feet in the Micene formation. It is on a 152-acre lease in the Francis Blandell Survey 872, A-788 and will be drilled by Bass Enterprises Production of El Campo as an outpost to the South Eagle Lake field.

### 4-H GROUNDBREAKING

Ground was broken for the \$1,375 million Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood, following a 10:30 a.m. ceremony Friday, February 22, in downtown Brownwood.

Construction on the 4-H Center is expected to begin

shortly with the Herman Bennett Company at Brownwood slated to build the youth facility on a 78-acre site near here.

The center will feature such programs as youth summer camps, leadership training, citizenship seminars, adult leader training, county 4-H camps, and family weekend retreats, announced H. T. Davison, Extension Service 4-H and youth specialist and 4-H Foundation executive director. The center will also be available to other groups and businesses interested in conducting educational programs.

Davison said that the \$1 million has been pledged by business, industry, foundations and individuals. In each Texas county, 4-H members and leaders are presently conducting fund raising activities.

Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1 donated the center site.
