

Clifton Hefner Wins \$1000, Mahalitc \$500

Rice FFA Members Win Many Places In Houston

Rice Future Farmers of America members had some outstanding entries in the Houston Livestock Show and brought home a large number of ribbons and prize money—including a first and second sweep in the junior commercial steer competition.

Clifton Hefner showed three Angus-Charolais cross entries in the commercial competition and won the first place prize of \$1,000. Anthony Mahalitc showed eight Hereford steers and won second place of \$500.00. Clifton also received a beautiful trophy for his first place win.

Boys competing in the commercial steer show not only showed animals but were also judged on personal interviews and on a thirty question examination about the feeding program. Clifton scored 29 correct answers on the thirty written question test.

In addition to the prize money all entries shared in a total of \$5000 in prize money on the basis of \$34.75 for each prime entry, \$27.80 for a choice steer, and \$20.85 for a good steer. Hefner had a prime and two choice ribbons and also received \$90.35 in ribbon money while Mahalitc had five prime and three choice ribbons and collected \$257.15 in ribbon money.

Wesley Wick was in the running for the grand champion Crossbreed Brahman right up to the final few moments of judging but had to settle for a second place ribbon. Three other Rice students won ribbons in the Crossbreed Brahman competition: Tammy Walker placed eighth; Robert Abel was ninth; and Thierry Hoffman tenth.

Others winning ribbon money in the commercial steer competition were: Wesley Wick, three good ribbons for his 3 Red Angus steers for a total of \$62.55 in ribbon money; James Black, three good ribbons for his Brangus steers, \$62.55 ribbon money; Daryl Hunt, one prime and two choice ribbons for his Angus-Charolais cross steers for a total of \$90.35.

Also, Calvin Mahalitc had eight choice ribbons for his Hereford-Brahman cross steers for \$278.00 in prize money; and Al Mahalitc, eight choice ribbons for Angus-Hereford cross steers for \$278.00 in ribbon money.

Commercial entries sold at auction following the show at prices ranging from 45 to 47¢ per pound.

James Hennske competed in the open Angus Bull competition with entries from all over the United States and won eighth, tenth, and fourteenth places with his entries.

In the Dairy Heifer Show, Rice had four winners, Robert Abel's entry rated a blue ribbon; Gregory Lopriore and Mark Henske had red ribbons; and Henske also received a white ribbon for another entry.

Tommy Burns had the only winner in the hog competition winning 25th place with his hog.

Rec. Center Bd. Allocates \$2000 To Tennis Activities

The Board of Directors of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center held an important session in the clubhouse at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 28th.

One of the items of importance was the allocation of \$2000.00 for the expenses of maintenance and improvements to the tennis courts at the Recreation Center. The directors also decided that if the full amount is not spent in the current year of 1974, the balance in funds will be retained in the tennis court fund for future use.

If anyone wishes to contribute specifically to this phase of the Recreation Center, donations will be gratefully accepted.

Alton (Butch) Herman was hired by the board to care for the golf course on weekends when the regular attendant is off duty. He will collect green fees and will rent golf carts. Mr. Herman will be paid 50% of the green fee collections and also half of the club's share for golf cart rentals.

The directors also decided to assess members who have golf cart storage facilities at the Center, a fee of \$3.00 per month for storage fees. Also it was decided that any future golf cart storage sheds will have to be approved first by the board of directors so that construction may comply with standards set out by the board. As in the past, persons who own golf carts and store them at home or away from the center will be permitted to use their carts without assessment.

The club now has four golf carts (electric) for rent for a fee of \$3.00 for nine holes.

The board also decided that any adult member who wishes to have a key to the clubhouse may request a key.

The next meeting of the board of directors of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center will be held at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 28th.

Baker Runs To Make Contest In City Election

Filing Deadline Tonite, Wed.

With the filing deadline for places on the ballot in the City of Eagle Lake and Rice Consolidated School District elections coming up at midnight today, Wed., Mar. 6th, two candidates have filed for the two places to be filled on the Rice Board and incumbent councilman Gene Baker filed for re-election to make a contest in the city council election. Both city and school elections will be held on Sat., April 6th.

Dr. Raymond R. Thomas filed this week for re-election to the Eagle Lake Position No. 5 on the Rice CISD board. Jose Garcia, an employee of Shell Oil Company

came the third candidate for two positions on the Eagle Lake City Council after he filed this week. Others who had filed earlier were James (Jimmy) Wood and Harold Raabe.

The other incumbent councilman whose term expires this year, Wilfred C. Luedcke, announced last week that he would not seek re-election.

At press time Wednesday morning, Mayor Elmer A. Struss, whose term also expires on April 6th, was the only candidate for the office of Mayor for the next two years.

City candidates must file with city secretary Miss Lucille Perry before midnight this Wed., Mar. 6th for a place on the ballot.

Excavation work and shaping of streets for the new Ridgele addition is progressing nicely and with good weather, the project should be well on its way by the end of this week.

Also construction is underway on an extensive expansion program at the Texaco plant at Chesterville; and the D. R. Wintermann bulk fertilizer facility in the rice mill area of the city is being enlarged.
