had a new contract to purchase gas from Texas South-eastern Gas Co. at 80¢ per thousand cubic feet. He added however that the company has been able to supply gas at a lesser figure, around 46¢ per 1000 cubic feet. A new contract with Texas South-eastern leaves the price of gas open, depending on the costs of the average weighted gas plus 17.7¢ per thousand for operating expenses.

Since the Eagle Lake Gas Distribution Co. is offering a new amended schedule calling for a reduction in the cost of gas effective with the March billing, said Mr. Thomas, He also cited the flexibility of costs of gas under the present energy crisis and asked for and received a deal/agreement when by the company can adjust its rates each month when the costs of gas from the supplier vary five cents under or five cents over the current costs.

Mayor Elmer Struss pointed out that this is the same type of agreement which was made in 1973.
