Philip A. Menella of Braham announced last week he will build a 150-bed convalescent home behind the Holiday Inn in Columbus on a site adjacent to that chosen for the new hospital.

Construction of the 1700, 000 facility will begin with official ground-breaking ceremonies at 1:30 p.m. April 1. Construction will take about 8 months.

Menella said that when the convalescent home is completed and filled to capacity it will employ between 75 and 100 persons. The payroll will run about \$400,000 a year, he said.

Drymalla Construction Co. will build the new convalescent home which will be identical to the Drymalla at West Columbia. Norman Wayne Douglas of Arlington is architect and engineer.

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Proposed Game; Fish Law Changes

This requirement which aims to facilitate enforcement of existing regulations would involve any special or additional fee.

At present, this tagging procedure is required for all trawlers in the state's public waters and commercial fishermen must use numbered tags at a fee of \$1 each for each 100 feet of trawline or fraction thereof. Both sport and commercial fishermen are now required to tag trawlers in salt water. The fee is \$1 for each 300 feet or fraction thereof.

Another would change the limit on the number of fish that can be taken in a single day to five.

One would prohibit use of any kind of hand-operated device to be used under water and designed to "snag" fish, commonly called "snooding" poles or gaffs.

Another would change the bag limit in all counties under regulatory authority to five fish per person.

Presently, the regulatory bag and possession limits are 25 and 50 on all three species in the aggregate, which allows a single angler to take as many as 25 flatheads per day if he has no channel or blue catfish in the aggregate.

A proposed change in freshwater fishing rules would make it unlawful for any person, while fishing on public waters, to catch and retain more than the daily bag limit of any game fish species regulated by the department.

Public hearings on the proposed changes will be conducted statewide during March 25-29 and will be held in this county Wed., Mar. 27 and the results will be presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in Austin.

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
