One of the most carefully considered and yet controversial provisions is the Highway User Fund. A description of what it is and what it does serves as our topic of discussion.

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Check Identity Of Would-Be Social Security Representative

The Brennan Social Security office has received a number of telephone calls from residents of Brennan. The people say that someone has called them and said they represented Social Security and Medicare. They wanted to call at the home of these people and discuss their Medicare policy and changes effective with January 1974. Some of the people making such telephone calls or calling in person represent the Social Security Administration or Medicare. They also are not authorized to say they represent Social Security and Medicare. They may be insurance salesmen trying to sell a supplemental commercial insurance policy—a policy to help pay hospital and medical costs that Medicare does not pay and cannot pay. Social Security and Medicare do not seek insurance. Social Security will not collect or come in person at 702 West Alamo, Brennan, Texas. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

REFLECTIONS ON International Sunday School Lesson

(Acts 8:18-31)

A noted author has lost confidence in the human race. He claims that he is saddened by the fact that men have learned to travel in space. He fears that man will carry "his destruction, corruption, clutter to other planets." He describes that men have made a "vast garbage dump" of the earth and visualizes his doing the same with every place he manages to travel to. There is little question that people can corrupt anything they touch. They learn the secret of the atom, with its tremendous power to bless mankind. The power is channeled into the destruction of a bomb. Even religion has not been excluded from man's terrible tools. The ancient Greeks and Romans have left in history the fact that they used the pagan religion to control the lives of the "mindless masses." Some have even robbed Christianity of its amazing supernatural power and reduced it to a mere psychological crutch or a tool for gaining community respect.

Even in the days of the early church, the Apostles were faced with people who possessed such a limited concept. A magician named Simon professed to have become converted to Christianity. He noted that when the disciples prayed for the Holy Spirit to take charge of people's lives that those people were changed. He tried to buy this gift because he felt that it was a religious ability that would make him popular and perhaps even turn a profit for him. He was immediately and sternly informed that God's gifts are not sold and are not for personal gain. Christianity made its bid for purity in strong terms.

True Christian faith evidences itself in what it does in the lives of people. In the eighth chapter of Acts you find a man named Philip contrasted with Simon. He obeyed God completely. He left a great religious awakening in Samaria and went out into a

Company customers throughout South Texas will find a new look in their electric bills next month when CPL begins using a new postcard bill.

Frank Sherrer, CPL manager, said the postcard bills, which will replace the sealed envelope form of bill, will be ready March 26 and whether any Social Security representative is supposed to be calling you or visiting you on a Social Security or Medicare matter.

If you think the person is misrepresenting himself as a representative of Social Security or Medicare, ask him for his name, the name of the company he represents and his phone number. Then report all the information to the Social Security office at Brennan. The Brennan office will mail him a bill similar to the one used several years ago.

MARKET REPORT

WHARTON LIVESTOCK INC.

The market on slaughter cows and bulls was one to two cents higher at the sale at Wharton County Livestock Market, Inc. Mar. 21st. Stocker and feeder calves sold steadily after last week's large advance. The firm handled 300 head replacement stocker heifers and cows for: 500 to 600 pound pregnant cows \$415 per head 600 to 700 pound heifers averaged \$285 and 300 to 350 pound heifers averaged \$165.

450 to 550 pound choice stockers and feeders sold 45 to 50; 500 to 600 pound stamper steers 36 to 40; 350 to 450 pound choice heifers 45 to 50; and utility slaughter cows 32 to 37 and bulls 42 to 47.

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
