Appelt Expected To File For Hearing At April 8 Meet

mittie which earlier this month presented petitions with nearly 400 names requesting that Coach Appelt be re-hired.

Mr. Thomas extended appreciation for the large number of persons on hand and for the interest shown and set out that opinions to be given by those desiring to speak were "not rehearsed" and were honest personal opinions.

Any person present who desired to speak was given an opportunity to do so. The list included Robert Schurring, Ervin Stenke, Ernest Uzzell, Jim Clippson, Jr., Bill Appelt, Ted Danklefs and Dr. J. C. Laughlin. Noteworthy is the fact that all but two were former board members, either in Eagle Lake or Garwood.

Mr. Schlurring asked the administration to cite reasons for not re-hiring Mr. Appelt so that he and others in the district might have an opportunity to know both sides of the question. "Right now all we know is what we hear on the streets and we need to know the board's feelings to properly judge its decision."

Mr. Brisco and Mr. Hunt again reiterated that under state law Mr. Appelt is entitled to a hearing but only if he requests such hearing in writing, and added that the board has been advised by their attorney to decline public statements on the matter until such request has been filed.

Mr. Hunt apologized to the board and to the audience for ignorance of the law, but added that "until legal procedures are complied with we have been advised by legal counsel not to make a statement at this time."

Brisco added that this is "not an easy matter." Board members investigated the matter of Mr. Appelt's contract thoroughly before arriving at their decision, he said.

Mr. Stenke pointed out to the board and audience that "Coaches are the best leaders that we can have. They must demand discipline." He added that discipline is something that is too often lacking in the homes.

Stenke added that athletes work hard and are worthy of special privileges and recognition "because they do things above and beyond those of the normal school student."

He added that the coach and administration need to be compatible and said he hoped that "we can get someone as good as Coach Appelt to assume the role of leadership demanded of a good coach."

Stenke concluded.

Mr. Uzzell commented that it was his opinion that the matter is nothing but a personality clash. "We need to know why Coach Appelt was not rehired. It would be a grave injustice if it were nothing but a personality conflict."

Mr. Clippson said that in his opinion the action was typical of how the school operates. "If we have made mistakes, have the honesty and punction to correct these mistakes."

Dr. Laughlin pointed out, "One point we are overlooking is that if the board makes public its reasons without having adhered to the laws governing such instances, the board members lay themselves open to a liable suit. If he (Mr. Appelt) wants it public then he must do it legally."

LCRA Plant

second in 1960.

The plant, unanimously approved by Austin city council members and the LCRA directors in a two hour executive session last Thursday, will be the first ever built by Austin or the LCRA with coal planned as a fuel source. The plant, according to the announcement, will begin operation with natural gas and will be converted to burn hard coal from western states.

According to John Babcock, LCRA's supervisor of research and development, the waters of two creeks, Cedar and Baylor, will be dammed to form the cooling lakes for the plant. The lakes will be joined by a channel at their upper end. The plant, located at the lower end of the lakes near the Missouri, Kansas-Texas Railway Line, will discharge hot water into one lake and the water will circulate around to the other lake for re-use when it is cooled. The headwaters of the lakes will extend northward past Highway 159 which will have to be re-routed in several areas.

Purchase of land is expected to begin as soon as engineering plans are completed, and purchase of the 6400 acres is expected to be completed by the end of this year.

Because of the nature of the terrain in this area, the lake will not flood many farm lands as would have a proposed dam site on the Colorado River south of Weimar.

the commissioners was to re-define the boundaries of Commissioners' Precinct 2, represented at this time by Commissioner A. J. Kainer, but he plans to retire on Jan. 1st. Precinct two was extended to take in the area up to Highway 90A including the Lake Sheridan and Judaville areas, thus removing the area from Commissioner Walter Henicke's Precinct 1 and adding it to Precinct 2. Mr. Henicke has had by far the largest area to serve and the removal of this area to Mr. Kainer's precinct will more equally distribute the land area as well as the roads to service.

All persons in this area formerly voting in the Sheridan voting precinct 7 have now been assigned to the Oaklawn voting precinct 8. The area will also be included in the Justice of the Peace Precinct No. 3 represented by Chester A. Walker instead of in JP Precinct 2 represented by W. A. Hefner.

The area south of Highway 90A and now assigned to Cong. Young's 14th District remains in the same voting precinct, in the same JP precinct 2 and in Commissioners precinct No. 1.

Another area affected by the court order is the portion of land bounded on the west by Highway 71, on the east by the river, on the north by Ramsey Alley survey and on the south by Tait Creek. This portion of land, now in the 14th Cong. District, was removed from Commissioner Bill Stiles' Precinct 4 and put back into Commissioner Walter Henicke's Precinct 1. It will also be included now in JP Precinct 1 represented by Richard C. Schmidt and residents in the area, estimated at around 20, will vote in Columbus voting precinct 1. The boundary for Commis-
