Life expectancy for the average resident of Colorado County has reached an all-time high.

A child born today to local parents has excellent prospects of living to the middle of the 21st century, even if there is further improvement in the future.

His expectancy at birth is now 71.2 years, according to the Institute of Health.

His expectancy beyond age 65 is greater than ever. For men it is over 12 years and, for women, nearly 17.

With the longer life span, the death rate in Colorado County has decreased, recently married,
