Interest rate on commodity loans to grain producers, effective with 1974 crop year loans.
The increase, from 5.5 to 7.25 per cent per year, will reflect the rising cost of money to the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Warehouse and farm storage loan service fees have also been increased to reflect additional costs in processing commodity loans on grain.
Warehouse storage loan service fees are increased from \$4 to \$6 per loan plus \$1 for each additional warehouse receipt over one.

Service fees on farm storage loans are increased from \$8 to \$10 per loan plus \$1 for each additional loan over one.
These increases will also be effective with 1974 crop year loans.

The availability of current crop year loans to producers and producer cooperatives is continued as in past years.
The loans provide late-infinancing for producers to assist them in orderly marketing of their crops.

Commodity loan operations have been carried out by CCC since 1933.
During the past fiscal year almost two billion dollars were made to producers for a total value of \$1.4 billion.
