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WILSON REPORTS: CONSTITUTION REVISION WORK CONTINUES DESPITE RECESS

While most of my fellow Constitutional Convention delegates were home during this recess in their districts, the members of the General Provisions Committee voluntarily met in Austin to continue our work on the General Provision Article. This new Article X includes 25 sections including a wide range of controversial topics - right-to-work, branch banking and bank mergers, right to privacy, rights of the handicapped, the home state, housing for the elderly, and a deepwater port. I would like to express hearty congratulations to the members of the General Provisions Committee for their work.

The right-to-work section included in the Constitution a prohibition on compulsory union membership as a requirement for a job. The branch banking and bank merger section maintains the present constitutional prohibition against branch banking (having more than one major office). This section also allows the regulation of the size of bank holding companies to the legislature.

A right to privacy provision was passed to guarantee that "no person shall be searched or seized without a warrant issued upon probable cause."

Members of the committee also passed a provision for the establishment of a judicial council to oversee the judiciary. This section is particularly important to credit agencies which keep credit records and make credit ratings. Equal rights for the mentally and/or physically handicapped were also included in the constitution.

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The business meeting was presided over by Mrs. H. C. Moeller, Regent. Mrs. W. H. Harrison, Chaplain, offered a prayer. Mrs. Willis Young of Weimar led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag, and Mrs. Moeller led the American's Creed. Mrs. W. M. Wilbeck of El Campo read the President General's message. Mrs. R. L. Praytor of Schulenburg, secretary, read the minutes of the last meeting. Mrs. Hopkins gave a report on the recent state convention.

Check-in time will be from 8:30 to 10 a.m. on June 15 and judging will begin at 11 a.m. All entries, including a \$3 fee per dog, must be submitted to the county Extension office in Columbus by May 15. Entries will be judged according to rules set forth by the American Kennel Club. Classes include Sporting Dogs, Hounds, Working Dogs, Terriers, Toy Dogs, Non-Sporting Dogs, Non-Purebred Dogs—25 pounds and under, Non-Purebred Dogs—26 pounds and over, Sub-Novice, Advance Novice—Class B, Excellent Obedience, and Showmanship. Trophies and ribbons will be presented in each class.

All dogs entered in the show must have a current vaccination certificate, be on a leash and be owned by the exhibitor or his or her family at least 30 days before the show. Entry forms and additional information on the upcoming show is available at the county Extension office, adds Garwood Wiemers.

The show is open to all 4-Hers that own dogs in the 17-county area of Extension District II.

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Marianne Burke Gold Key Guide at Womans Col.

I did not vote against it, but I could not bring myself to vote for some of the sections. I do hope the necessary changes are made in the constitution, so I can vote for Article X after the floor debate.

Two Rice Drying Clinics Set
