CONSTITUTION REVISION WORK CONTINUES DESPITE RECESS

(By Rep. John Wilson.) While most of my fellow Constitutional Convention delegates were home during this recess-in their districts, the members of the General Provisions Committee voluntarily met in Austin to complete our work on the General Provisions Act. This new act includes 25 sections including a wide range of controversial topics—right-to-work, branch banking and bank mergers, right to privacy, rights of the handicapped, the homestead, housing for the elderly, and a deepwater port. I would like to explain briefly each of these sections to you.

The right-to-work section included in the Constitution a prohibition on compulsory union membership as a requirement for a job. The branch banking and bank merger section prohibits the present constitutional prohibition against branch banking having more than one major office. This section also leaves the regulation of the size of bank holding companies to the legislature.

A right to privacy provision was passed to guarantee that citizens would not be harassed by government agencies for legitimate purposes as is judged by the legislature. This section is particularly important to credit agencies which keep credit records and make credit ratings.

4-H boys and girls and their canine friends will have an opportunity to compete in the First Annual District Dog Show June 15 at the Fairgrounds in Angleton.

The show is open to all 4-Hers that own dogs in the 17-county area of Extension District II.

Check-in time will be from 8:30 to 10 a.m. on June 15 and judging will begin at 11 a.m.

All entries, including a \$3 fee per dog, must be submitted to the county Extension office in Columbus by May 15.

Entries will be judged according to rules set forth by the American Kennel Club. Classes include Sporting Dogs, Hounds, Working Dogs, Terriers, Toy Dogs, Non-Sporting Dogs, Non-Purebred Dogs—25 pounds and under, Non-Purebred Dogs—26 pounds and over, Sub-Novice, Advance Novice, Class B, Excellent Obedience, and Showmanship. Trophies and ribbons will be presented in each class.

All dogs entered in the show must have a current vaccination certificate, be on a leash and be owned by the exhibitor or his or her family at least 30 days before the show.

Two clinics on rice drying are being planned for May 2 in Bay City and Angleton.

The clinic on May 2 will be especially designed for the 48-year-old rice dryer operators, according to W. S. Allen, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It will begin at 9 a.m. at the Community Center in Bay City.

The program will feature discussions on dust control equipment, clear air requirements, the market outlook, energy management, and the energy situation, in addition to discussions on portable batch drying and storage methods, controlling insects, on-farm storage costs and OSHA requirements as related to farm rice dryers.

According to Allen, the discussion on the outlook of the rice market should be of interest to everyone in the rice industry. The speaker will be Ralph S. Newman, Jr., general manager of American Rice, Inc., Houston.

The clinics are being conducted by the Extension Service in cooperation with the Central Power and Light Co. and the Community Public Service Co.

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LOCAL FAMILIES MAINTAIN HIGH LIVING STANDARDS

What effect has inflation had, during the past five years or so, of Colorado County residents? Did they stop buying luxury items and limit themselves to bare necessities?

Not so you could notice. There is little evidence that the cost of living pinch restrained them to a great degree.

On the contrary, judging by the amount of money they spent in the period for cars, new household equipment and other costly durables, they have been maintaining their normal standard of living.

An indication of the way families in Colorado County are adjusting to inflation is contained in a nationwide survey made by the Department of Commerce, covering the five years ending January, 1973.

It reveals how much was spent in various parts of the country for major durable products. It shows, as would be expected, that such discretionary expenditures were closely related to income. In Colorado County, where average income, and therefore purchasing power, has been relatively stable, the survey shows that families are maintaining their normal standard of living.

For example, the survey shows that families in Colorado County are spending more on cars and trucks than they were five years ago. This is true for all parts of the country, but the increase in Colorado County is particularly noticeable.

Another example is the increase in spending for household appliances. Families in Colorado County are spending more on refrigerators, washing machines, and other household appliances than they were five years ago.

These figures show that families in Colorado County are maintaining their normal standard of living, despite the effects of inflation. They are spending more on cars, household appliances, and other costly durables than they were five years ago.

The survey also shows that families in Colorado County are spending more on food and clothing than they were five years ago. This is true for all parts of the country, but the increase in Colorado County is particularly noticeable.
