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Mint Appeals For Return Of the Penny

"I'm calling on every American, especially young people, to get the penny back in circulation and keep it there," Mrs. Mary Brooks, Director of the Mint, said. "I'm calling on the banking industry to welcome the return of pennies during the month of June. I'm urging schools, churches, charities, retail establishments and others to examine ways and means to involve their members in collecting pennies for deposit."

The price of copper has risen, causing a shortage of pennies in circulation. Mrs. Brooks said that there will be no aluminum pennies produced during the past 15 years have no numismatic value and because of the huge mintage they will never attain great value, she said.

Nevertheless, speculators and hoarders of pennies have caused what seems to be a shortage of pennies in certain areas of the country. The shortage is not a shortage of a supply of pennies. Creating a shortage where it does not exist can adversely affect every public spirited citizen, taxpayer and conservator of the earth's resources. It is inflationary for merchants start to round off sales to the next nickel due to lack of pennies to make change.

"Again, I'd like to emphasize, there are plenty of pennies. But they are in the wrong places," said Mrs. Brooks.

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SFB II Is Most Modern Processing Plant In U.S.

The new Sealy Food Bank II, a division of Texas Agribusiness, Inc., is the most modern meat packing and processing plant in the United States and is being hailed as a valuable addition to this area which is predominantly interested in livestock and farming.

The Sealy Food Bank II held open house and dedication ceremonies last week-end and hosted thousands of guests. The new facilities, Mr. and Mrs. Fred R. Franks represented the Eagle Lake Headlight at a preview show of the facilities Thursday evening.

The new addition to Sealy Food Bank is a 12,000 square foot building adjoining the existing plant. The new plant was acquired by Texas Agribusiness Co. in December of 1972. The plant will be operated under the supervision of the Meat and Poultry Inspection Program of the U.S.D.A. Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service.

William C. Sartwell, vice president of Sealy Food Bank II, conducted a tour of the facilities for the newsmen and other guests. He described such innovations as the on-the-rail gravity dressing system where the carcass is hoisted to a high rail and it never touches the floor again. All dressing operations are done from a standing level, with no stooping.

The old fashioned skinning knives are out at Sealy Food Bank II and are replaced with a new Jarvis "Air Knives" machine run by compressed air and guided by skilled human hands.

A large Johnson model strip-performs its magic and automatically strips the hide from the carcass.

Mr. Sartwell pointed out that the plant has a capacity of forty head per hour but plans are to operate at a round 20 to 30 head per hour and approximately 200 head per day.

One of the novel features of the plant is a pharmaceutical work-up room for the disposal and cooperation with medical and veterinary researchers especially in the area of meat inspection. University of Texas Medical School, Shrine Burn Institute at Galveston and College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

In this area full facilities will be available to researchers and in improving medical techniques.

The open house continued for those business men and guests on Friday and then on Saturday and Sunday the facilities were open to the public following dedication activities at 2:30 p.m. The Honorable John C. White, the State Commissioner of Agriculture was the dedication speaker.

Beef Supply Influences Consumption

AUSTIN-Meat production figures for 1973 indicate lessened supply rather than lessened demand caused a per capita drop in meat consumption, said Agriculture Commissioner John C. White recently.

Per capita consumption dropped from 190 pounds in 1972 to 175 pounds.

Beef production was down five percent to 21.3 billion pounds; pork, down six percent to 12.8 billion pounds; veal down 22 percent to 357 million and lamb down five percent to 514 million pounds. Total meat production was off six percent below 1972.

White said consumers ate all that was produced, but that consumer resistance seems to be entrenched. It is self due to changes in shopping patterns that grew out of periods of short supply last year.
