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South Texas CC Vacation Guide Available

The wide variety of activities and attractions in South Texas this vacation season is highlighted in the South Texas Vacation Guide, just published by the South Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Soil District Report

Muddy Ponds Can Be Cleared

Muddy or turbid ponds are frequently a problem in our area. According to Richard L. Christie, District Conservationist, Columbus, turbid water prevents maximum growth of fish food. By careful observation the cause of silt or clay particles can normally be located. The source of pollution must be corrected.

Many times barren clay soil or cultivated fields on the watershed are responsible for the muddy water. This can be corrected by diverting runoff from fields with terraces and adding the remaining watershed or improving the existing vegetative cover.

The action of waves and clay dams or pond banks may muddy water. Sodding the pond and dam banks with grass or lining the bank and dam with rocks will control the wave action.

Livestock wading in shallow water can stir up mud. To correct this the pond might be fenced and a pipe placed in the pond to catch water to a trough outside the fenced area.

Rough fish such as carp, buffalo or shad may be stirring up silt. Someone may be used to remove rough fish from the pond. This would require reseeding the pond with desirable fish.

Once the source of the particles has been eliminated, gypsum may be used to hasten clearing. Broadcast agricultural gypsum on the surface of the pond at the rate of 75 to 100 pounds per acre.

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CALLING ALL HOMEMAKERS

Install Drapery Hardware With Professional Look

Mounting method can mean the difference between professional-looking drapes and those looking "homemade."

The first step in proper installation involves deciding on the desired effect--and the hardware needed to produce this effect. Next comes measuring accurately--taking into consideration the full coverage desired.

Don't forget to allow additional length for stackback--space needed for opened, drawn drapes.

This varies with window width and fabric weight. Most drapery departments have charts available to help determine the correct hardware to allow.

When checking to see if rods can be seen in the window from the outside, when mounted on a window frame, open drapery "stackback" over the glass--reducing the window's light and ventilation potential and beauty.

When mounting conventional traverse rods on the wall, allow about two inches above the window frame.

Mount decorative rods, on the other hand, slightly higher, about two and three-fourths inches above the frame--because drapery tops actually are lower than the rod.

If a window doesn't have a frame, place rod about four inches above the upper window center.

Grass cuttings or hay may be broadcast on the pond to speed up clearing. Normally about 1 to 2 tons of hay per surface acre of water is adequate. Hay will not give good results if the water is highly turbid.

Harrison said the nation faces a penny shortage that costs taxpayers millions because people are withholding some 30 million pennies from circulation.

This means that nearly half of the 62 billion pennies the U.S. Mint has produced in the last 15 years are in hiding. The Mint is still producing one-cent coins at a rate of \$5 million a day, he added.
