Pickle For Tripling Funds For Outdoors
U. S. Rep. J. J. (Jake) Pickle said last week he is sponsoring legislation to more than triple the federal appropriation for purchasing National Parks, Forests, Wilderness Areas and Wild and Scenic Rivers.

The "Save Outdoor America" bill, introduced Monday by 20 congressmen, would boost annual Land and Water conservation - funding from \$200 million to \$1 billion with part of the revenue from the oil leases on the Outer Continental Shelf, Pickle said.

"Action on this measure will allow rapid clearance of a seven-year backlog of new parks already authorized by law," Pickle said. "Former property owners would be quickly without the long period of legal limbo now caused by insufficient funding."

Funding formulas for the Land and Water Conservation Fund would also be modified by the bill to channel a larger proportion of federal money into preserving America's wilderness, Pickle said.

Existing 60%-federal, 40%-state grants would be tripled for most states, he said, and the present 50/50 land acquisition program would be changed to provide 70% federal funding.
