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**BOB BULLOCK**  
Bullock, Demo Nominee For Comp. Here

Bob Bullock, Democratic nominee for State Comptroller, was in Eagle Lake this week to say "thank you" to the voters of Colorado County who gave him a 11-1 vote in the primary.

Bullock won the Democratic nomination with the largest percentage vote of any candidate statewide race. He carried all but one of Texas' 234 counties.

Visiting every county in Texas during the primary, Bullock said he "prefers to talk to the people personally instead of hiding behind words and gimmicks, ground out by clever public relations people."

The size of his victory shows the people support improvements and reforms he recommends for the Comptroller's Office, Bullock said.

Bullock, 45, gained statewide acclaim as Secretary of State. He also has served as Assistant Attorney General and a member of the House of Representatives. He is a veteran of the Korean Conflict and lives in Austin with his wife Amelia and son Bob.

During the campaign Bullock has called for an end to costly collection methods which he says cost the state millions of dollars a year by "fly-by-night" operators.

Bullock has promised to cut down the amount of red tape facing businesses, in handling and paying state taxes. Other reforms urged by Bullock have included quicker processing of city sales taxes by the state.

### County Buys Prec. 3 Truck From Brasher

Colorado County Commissioners' Court in regular session Monday morning approved a bid of \$6,037 for the purchase of a new truck for Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker's Precinct 3. The bid was actually the third lowest bid among four that were offered but the court exercised its right to "waive all technicalities and reject any or all bids."

Lowest bid came from one-half ton truck was made by Shubel-Schneider Co. of Columbus which offered a 1975 International for \$5,995 after trade-in of an older truck.

Commissioner Leyendecker recommended that the bid be rejected since the bidder failed to specify a delivery date as was requested in the specifications.

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Commissioner Leyendecker recommended the acceptance of the third-lowest bid, that of Brasher Motor Co. of Weimar which offered a 1975 Chevrolet for \$6,037 with delivery in December. The commissioner pointed out that the \$41 difference in the bid would not compensate for the better service that could be obtained from a firm that operates in this county.
