Crenshaws Welcome Daughter

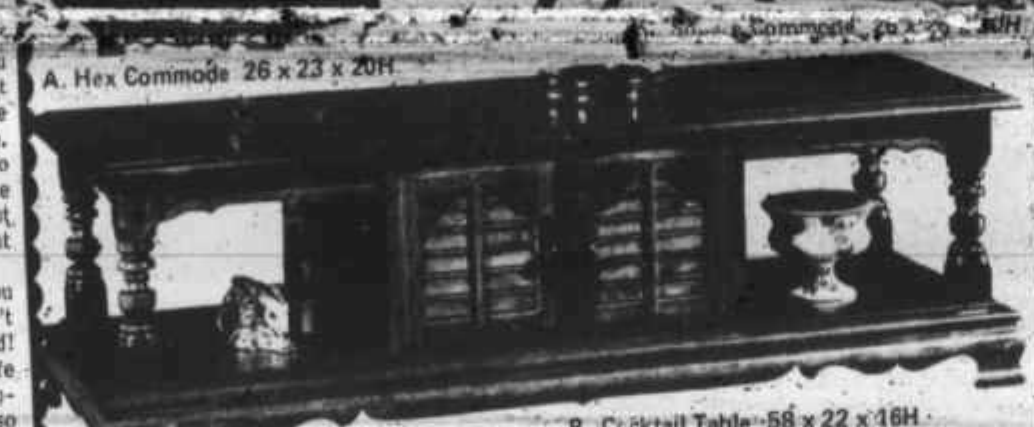

HOW TO SELECT FRESH GREENS!

When some people think of fresh greens, they usually think of those leaves and stems that are served cooked, such as spinach, mustard, collard, kale and turnip tops. Others think of salad things such as bibb and head lettuce, escarole, or endive. And, of course, some greens can be used either way.

Most greens, however they are used, are high in many vitamins and minerals, yet low in calories.

The weight watcher's delight. The key to vitamins and minerals content is the color. Usually, the darker the color, the higher the content of vitamins A and C, and iron.

The key to the good selection of greens is freshness. The leaves should look fresh, be crisp and tender, free from injury or insect damage. The stems should be firm, never large and coarse.

Head lettuce should be firm and compact, free from signs of rot or insect damage.

While freshness is the key for selection, you can help retain that goodness at home. As with all fresh produce, take greens home promptly and store them properly. Most people prefer to wash greens before storage. If you do, be sure to dry them well before placing them in a plastic bag. For best results, store greens in the vegetable section of the refrigerator for only a few days before using them.

One pound of bulk greens yields an average of two cups when cooked. Use as little water as possible for spinach, young mustard, chard or beet tops, and cook them only until they are tender. The more mature mustard, turnip and collard greens require more water and longer cooking. Season your greens to suit your taste with bits of bacon or ham.
