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Co. Judge Cites Need For Revenue Sharing Funds

County Share To Be \$1.2 Million

Colorado County Judge Lester J. Cranek was the speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club last week when he gave the following insight into the benefits that have been derived from a federal revenue sharing program.

Judge Cranek commented that in the beginning he was opposed to the revenue sharing program because he felt that this nation had a large national debt and felt that the funds, primarily from income taxes, should be used to retire this debt.

He said that he expressed the hope prior to passage of the program by Congress that if the program was approved it would be a "one-time" thing and that the funds, primarily from income taxes, should be used to retire this debt.

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national scale on expenditures with the bulk of the expenditures going to road and bridge funds for work on roads, bridges and other transportation projects. County expenditures to date have totaled \$594,792 as follows: \$383,800 to road and bridge funds or transportation; \$210,992 to the children's water district; \$400 to public safety in the form of funds for the county's highway safety patrol; \$7000 to libraries; \$32,000 for the elevator in the courthouse; and \$47,000 to fire departments. He said \$125,994 to be received in 1974.

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Stiles Questions Loss of Rev. Due To Tax Cut

The following statement was received by the Eagle Lake Headlight from Precinct 4 Colorado County Commissioner L. W. (Bill) Stiles, Jr., relative to losses announced last week in revenue sharing proceeds due to the 20% per \$100 tax cut made last year in county taxes.

"In our Commission's Court meeting on July 8, a statement was announced which indicated that the County would receive \$120,000 less in Revenue Sharing funds in 1974 than received in 1973. This reduction was blamed on

Commissioner's Court action in reducing the tax rate in 1974. "Please allow me to set the record straight. The first two quarters of 1973 the county received \$78,378.00 per quarter, and the last two quarters our county received \$87,997 per quarter. Then, after our 20% lower tax rate began in 1974, our Revenue Sharing funds remained the same. We have received \$87,997.00 for each of the four quarters in 1974. "I point this out because there are forces in the Court House which would like to have higher taxes. My commitment and primary concern is conservative government, because I believe the much more accurate will be the death of our Republic. Sincerely, Louis W. Stiles
