4 Charged In Assault On City Officer

Four persons are charged with aggravated assault on an officer, a third degree felony charge, and seven, including three on duty heavy fines in Eagle Lake city court as the result of an incident at the Midlight Bar at 10:23 p.m. Sunday, August 4.

City Patrolman Rufford Ashley and Game Warden Sam Sandoz were called to the bar on the 10th floor of the building. One of the burglars enjoyed a repeat of bread, a dozen or so, and a box of candy and a half carton of rum as well as a transistor radio.

As the officers entered they found Freddie Martinez, Rachel Ferral, Jessie Ferral, Angie Gonzales and Luis Martinez involved in a fight. The officers finally arrested the two and escorted them outside the building. En route to their car, they reported that Sandoz Martinez, whose birthday was being celebrated when the fight started, approached the officers and attempted to take Rachel Ferral from custody. He reportedly began to swing at the officers and while Ashley tried to subdue Martinez with a minimum of force, he was attacked by Luis Martinez, Rachel Ferral and Sandoz Martinez and a 16 year old juvenile.

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Hearing On Record Rice CISD Budget Mon.

Charlie Haines Outstanding Senior Citizen At Sheridan

The public is invited to attend a hearing on the proposed new 1974-75 budget for the Rice Consolidated Independent School District at 8:00 p.m. Monday night, August 19th in the Administration Building at Alamo.

Supi, Krivacka said that the 1974-75 budget will be a balanced budget. It is anticipated that the 1973-74 budget will have a deficit of \$25,000 to be absorbed by surplus accumulated by the district, \$71 million valuations.

The budget is based on a total valuation of \$71 million, the highest ever for the district as compared with a \$55.6 million total valuation in 1973-74. This increase reflects a steady rise in oil and gas valuations due to the high prices being paid at this time for oil and gas, plus additional valuation obtained through new construction, by increasing the assessment ratio from 35 to 36 1/2 of actual value, and a re-assessment of land values in the county.

"By March when action was taken by the board on increasing land values and on increasing the assessment ratio, it was anticipated that the tax rate would be \$1.69, based on total valuations of \$66 million," he said. "But due to the increase in oil and gas valuations, the valuations have increased to \$71 million thereby enabling the district to reduce that proposed tax rate to \$1.61 per \$100 valuation as proposed in the new budget."

He said that the \$1.61 total tax rate, which will be before the board for final approval Monday, designates 27c per \$100 for debt service and \$1.34 for local maintenance. Rising costs of materials and operation, increased pay to teachers and rising transportation costs were cited as factors in the additional expenditures required for the proposed new 1974-75 budget.

Points out that the budget hearing Monday night is open to the public and is an opportunity for anyone who appears as a factor in the additional expenditures required for the proposed new 1974-75 budget.

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Rice Prices Show Little Advance Tues.

The rice market showed only slight improvement during the past week.

On Wednesday last week the top bid of the day in a sale at the Eagle Lake office of the American Rice Growers Cooperative Association was \$5.64 per Cwt. or \$11.68 per barrel bid by West Texas Mill for three lots of Labelle rice grown by L. R. Gullman (2 lots) and Bill Blair, None of the bids made on the twelve lots were accepted.

On Tuesday of this week, the top bid of the day at the Garwood Rice Sales Co. was \$10.24 per Cwt. or \$18.58 per barrel.

The Eagle Lake office of the ARG Association will hold another sale this Wednesday with a big offering of over 150 hundredweight of rice in 15 lots.

Top bid of the day at Garwood Tuesday went to Huvay & Huvay for Labelle rice. El Co was top bidder of the day on all fourteen lots. Four mills offered bids, but three passed, James Hopkins, manager of the company, said that it is unlikely that much of the rice, if any, will sell at the prices offered Tuesday.
