

## Cotton Picture Becoming Interesting

The cotton market has been fairly quiet in recent months, but that situation should change before too long, contends a marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"With dwindling mill stocks of cotton and a crop situation still highly subject to the vagaries of weather, mills should soon begin to buy new crop cotton, and that should boost prices," believes Charles K. Baker.

Another big factor, says Baker, is the foreign mills. "They may actually start the buying spree, and when they do, domestic mills will want to get their share of the crop before prices move too high. For domestic mills, it's been a wait and see attitude, but now buying begins, the market should perk up."

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## Now House Corp., East B., Builds Sectional Houses

The Now-House Corporation, manufacturers of sectional houses, located in the East Bernard Industrial Park, has announced that the Yob family of Houston. Family members in the business are Joseph C. Yob, David Yob, Carl Yob and Theresa Yob. The Yob's have been in business for 40 years.

The interiors are fully carpeted, floors are tiled or carpeted, and the kitchens include built-in cabinets and appliances. Exterior doors are standard or sliding patio doors. Bathrooms have either a shower or tub. Heating and air-conditioning units are included. The houses have raised ceilings which add a spacious, contemporary style to these well-built homes.

The company is currently building a new, multi-unit apartment for J. Edgar Smith, Jr. and his family on the site of the old plant near Matagorda.

Plant production has been increased substantially to enable delivery within a month. While the company can build larger size homes, it is the intention of the management at this time to manufacture two-section units with 240, 320, and 400 feet, according to specifications that the customer may desire.

The finished house is delivered to any suitable lot anywhere in 150 mile radius. The new owners are welcomed to visit the plant and see the finished house in person.

## Dr. Klosterboer Agronomist At Beaumont Sta.
