Damages Asked In Accident

A suit was filed in district court last Friday seeking nearly a quarter million in damages as the result of an accident in the repair of a gas line in the Chesterville area Dec. 9, 1972.

Albert A. Strelec is the plaintiff in the case and the defendants are Mobil Oil Corp.,

a division of Socony Oil Co., Inc.

Strelec alleges that he was severely burned in an explosion that occurred when he was welding on a gas line pipe. He contends that he cut off a bleed off valve but apparently someone turned the valve back on and the explosion resulted.

He is seeking a total of \$246,999.12 for injuries, hospital and medical care and for damages.

that are available. If our costs do not stabilize soon, we will have to pass on these excessive costs to the customers with new rates and schedules. Sound policies and conservative practices have enabled the City to operate satisfactorily.

"Our bond rating has been properly maintained. The laws regulating bond indebtedness have been complied with much diligence. It pleases me to know our bond debt is being reduced each year on schedule. I would like to work for a debt-free city which I believe Eagle Lake can become in a few years."

"We have enjoyed the capital improvement program the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund has provided. It is my goal to use these federal funds to provide buildings, equipment and machinery and to use our normal general funds for maintenance purposes. The State Sales Tax revenues are helpful in maintaining a strong financial program. These two programs have certainly helped in keeping our ad valorem taxes at a reasonable level for the citizens."

"Now that nearly all the streets are paved, we hope to maintain them in good order. Annual maintenance programs of asphalt overlays and sealcoating will preserve the streets. We want to devote more efforts to improve the drainage. The citizens are pleased with hard-surfaced streets and better drainage facilities. A new street sweeper will help improve the cleanliness and speed the drainage along the curbed streets."

"Other new and improved machinery and equipment will be needed to replace older antiquated items. We will add such items to the budget on a priority basis of need and costs. Repairs to the older equipment becomes more costly each time it goes to the shop."

"I recommend that we continue to operate the Eagle Lake Gas Distribution Company on a contract basis. It is compatible to the City's operation, and we enjoy a profit from our contract fee arrangement. "Again, I want to commend my co-workers for their accomplishments and support. The citizens and city administration have been wonderful to work with, and all the cooperation makes one appreciate being a city manager. It is my desire to support and work towards the goal of keeping the City of Eagle Lake a very respected community."

vehicle to the intersection to see that there was no mistake about the identity of the violator.

In just a matter of an hour, the officers issued a total of 22 tickets, and the big majority (17) of these went for gravel trucks. However, the truckers apparently got word out quickly to others headed toward this city and in the last part of the stay here, most of the tickets were given to occupants of cars and pickups.

Highway Patrol Sergeant Gilbert Keil of Columbus directed the operations. He was assisted on the ground by Patrolmen Gary Eden, Alton Adcock and Chas. Ford, also by Sheriff's Road Patrol Deputy Bryan Touchette; and City Police Chief Roy Chisum.

DPS officers set up another helicopter surveillance at the intersection of FM 1093 and 90A Tuesday morning and in two hours of work had stopped 32 motorists for speeding violations, fourteen of which were to truckers.

The DPS officers expressed hopes that the surprise element of surveillance by air might be a factor in reducing speed of all motorists on highways in the area, and as a result make motoring on the highways safer and more enjoyable.

1974 Rice Moving at a Slow Pace

The 1974 rice market continues weak and sale of the newly harvested rice continues at almost a snail's pace.

To date the Eagle Lake office has sold around 200,000 hundred weight of rice, almost all on lot by lot negotiations with the mills, said manager Donald Obenhaus.

The Eagle Lake office held a sale last Wednesday with 26 lots totalling 145,516 Cwt. up for bids and offers made by the mills dropped slightly with \$10.93 per Cwt. or \$17.70 per barrel the top bid of the day. Comet offered that bid for rice grown by V. R. Corman and Sons.

Another sizeable offering of rice is expected to go up for bids in another sale at the Eagle Lake office on Wednesday of this week.

Garwood Rice Sales offered 21 lots of rice for bids Tuesday with \$11.11 per Cwt. top bid offered by Blue Ribbon for rice by Lester J. Crane and by R. R. Stallman.

ing, breaking, punching, etc., machines for the manufacture of all parts used in making farm equipment with the exception of bearings, augers and teeth for spring tooth harrows.

"We average employment of twenty-four persons at this facility," said Anderson. In winter months the payroll will include around 17 to 18 persons and in summer from 25 to 30 persons. He estimated annual payroll from \$180,000 to \$200,000 per year.

Allen Marquardt is the president of Anderson Manufacturing, Inc., and serves as the shop manager. Mrs. Everett Anderson is a vice president. Mrs. Joyce Stanick, secretary, and Mr. Anderson is chairman of the board and treasurer.

Mr. Helman, who presently lives in Columbus but plans to move here soon, joined Anderson Manufacturing a short time ago and is sales manager for whole goods manufactured by the firm. Ed Andel is the production manager; Richard Spates is service department manager; and a parts department manager will be named in the immediate future.

"Eighty per cent of the sales made by Anderson Manufacturing, Inc. are to customers outside the Eagle Lake community, many out of state, bringing much new money to add to the local economy," Anderson stated. "About a third of the sales were to out of state customers." He anticipated even greater sales to out of state customers and has established dealerships in these states to handle sales for his firm.

In discussing the manufacture of farm products, he pointed out the necessity for planning at least twelve months in advance especially in the purchase of materials, often difficult to obtain due to shortages or strikes.

Primary product of the Anderson firm is the grain auger cart. The firm makes 90, 100 and 140 barrel carts with construction beginning in March and ending in July. Last season the firm manufactured 70 auger carts and anticipated making 200 next year.

"The carts you see sitting around our facility are all sold and are going to Arkansas and Louisiana. The firm had completed sale of all of its anticipated production by

June of this year. Another popular product is the spring tooth harrow and production will be upped from 300 sets this year to 700 next year. "Water boxes are another item produced at Anderson's and the firm anticipates making from 9000 to 12,000 of the galvanized 16 gauge steel water boxes next year, and anticipates a levelling off at around 10,000 per year. In order to install the water boxes, Mr. Anderson and his engineering and production staff, have designed a simple-to-operate levee box and the firm has a patent pending on the unique design of the equipment. Of sixty manufactured last year, forty were sold and the firm anticipates the sale of these and at least 75 more next season as their specialty boxes are known over the Gulf Coast rice region.

Just for the fun of it, Anderson Manufacturing also makes miniature sugar carts some of which are sold, some go as gifts to prominent customers. Among the twenty-four employees averaged over a year, the great majority reside locally and are paid wage scales equivalent to or better than those for field work. Their payroll gives a considerable boost to the economy of the area and the name of Eagle Lake will soon be seen in many states in the area as manufactured items bear the familiar Anderson Manufacturing Inc., of Eagle Lake decal.

Chamber of Commerce members and citizens of the community join in heralding Anderson Manufacturing, Inc. as a truly valuable addition to this community and extend best wishes for the continued success and growth of the firm, commented C.C. president Mark Anderson.

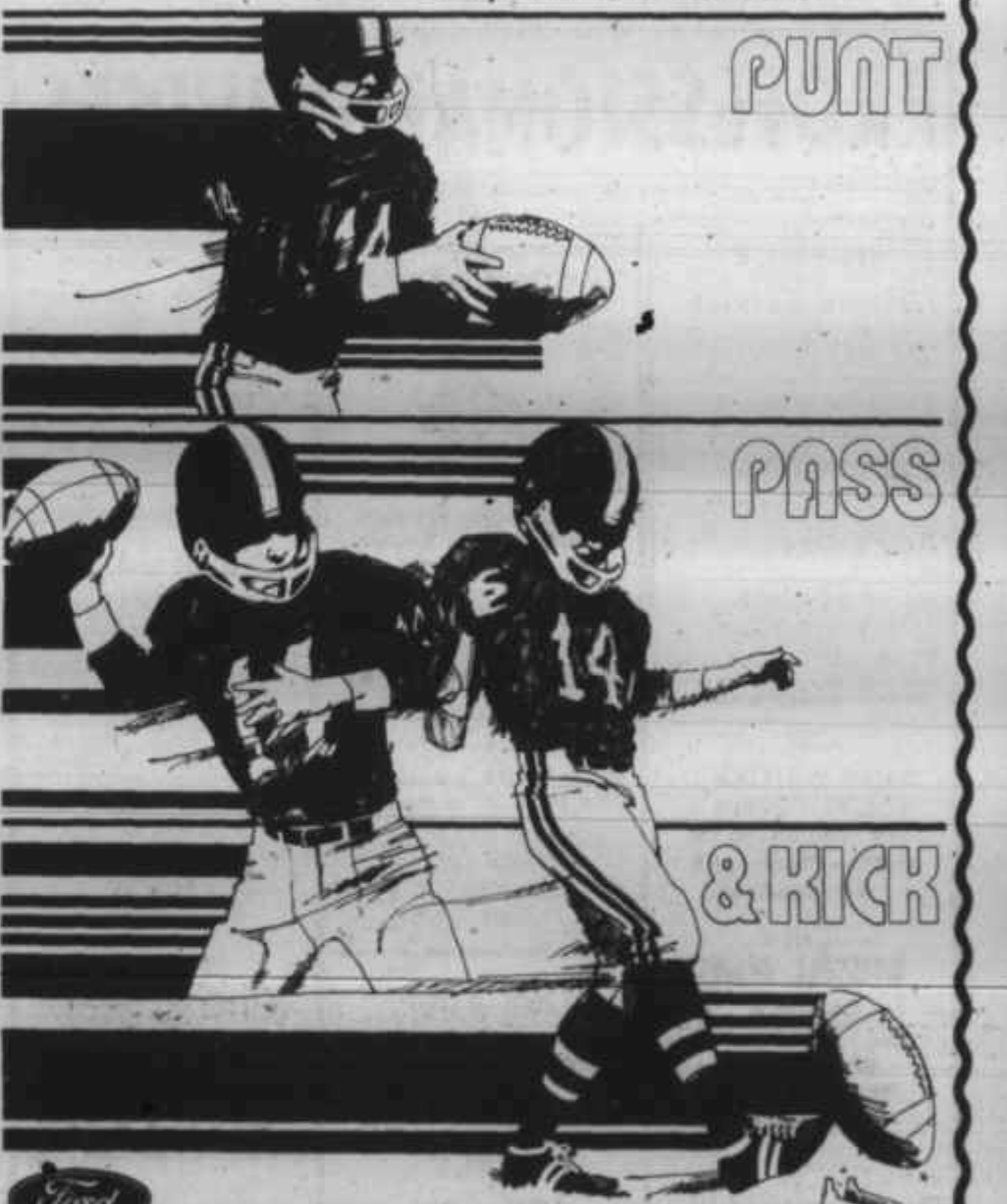
