Commissioner for the opportunity and encouragement which it had offered to herself and to other women throughout the state. She stated that she was pleased to do original research on the status of women. Dr. Thomas called for a greater unity between governments and people of North and South America. She stated that "cultural, historical, and geographical differences have been too long kept the men and women of North and South America unaware, uninformed, and uninvolved in the realities of the lives and futures of one another - a fact which has impeded unity and understanding among nations." She believes that the countries of the Americas must be partners in a research and development program for self-development, peace and human dignity. She charged that "until the Americas are more fully assimilated into the social and political structures of the American continent, as a contributing and creative force, our countries will continue to have lost an invaluable human resource, which will affect both people and governments."

Through careful planning and cooperation, we must seek the rapid elimination of poverty, illiteracy, discrimination, and of other forces which impede human development in each of our countries," stated Dr. Thomas. In conclusion, Dr. Thomas thanked the Inter-American Commission of Women for its work on behalf of all women of the Americas, and for its work on behalf of all humanity. The research award winner was chosen by six women leaders, who determined that the work by Dr. Thomas on "The Political Participation of the Woman in Colombia" was the best.

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Stuessy Plans Completion Of Work

The truck has 7,100 actual miles. The item is a 1962 Ford Falcon deluxe club wagon with only 13,500 actual miles. The fire truck formerly was used by the fire department for an emergency unit.

Both items have been replaced by new pieces of equipment.

REC. CENTER TENNIS COURTS GET BIG IMPROVEMENT

A big improvement program at the lighted tennis courts in the Eagle Lake Recreation Center has been completed and the projects should make the courts even more popular with young and old.

The project is under the supervision of the Eagle Lake Recreation Center and the Eagle Lake Tennis Association with the cooperation of Precinct four county commissioners. Bill Siles and other local citizens.

Eagle Lake Lions' Clubs contributed some funds for the addition of playground equipment at the courts.

Backstops at the two courts were widened with the addition of a ten foot wing at each corner. Also a wire retainer has been added at the practice court; new retaining posts strung with cable were added at the west side of the courts.

The primary project, however, was the resurfacing of the courts, an item which was carried out by Precinct 4 County Commissioner Bill Siles with revenue sharing funds allocated to this project.

Eagle Lake Recreation Center provided funds for base materials. Resurfacing of the courts has been badly needed. The playing surface had deteriorated badly through use and by waters which had eroded the area over several occasions.

Members of the Ladies Tennis Club have re-surfaced the courts.

Everett Anderson assisted with the project which was under the supervision of Joe Reed, Jr., head of the Eagle Lake Tennis Association.

2 Die In Head-On Auto Crash Near Columbus Sun.

Two persons were killed and two others critically injured in a two car head-on collision on Highway 173 near Columbus at approximately 11:35 a.m. Sunday morning.

His report showed that a 1973 Chevrolet driven by Leon Gonzalez, Jr., 22, of Eagle Lake and a 1974 Ford Galaxie, driven by Gloria Gonzalez, 34, of Columbus were involved in the head-on collision. Both of the drivers were killed instantly.
