Mrs. Elbert Whorton Named Goodwill Distinguished Citizen

Mrs. Elbert Whorton, formerly Evangeline Ann Loessin of Eagle Lake, the daughter of Mrs. Herbert Loessin and the late Mr. Loessin, recently was named by Goodwill Industries in Galveston as a 1974 Distinguished Citizen of Galveston and Brazoria Counties. Johnny Mitchell of Houston and the Reverend Charles K. Anastasiou of Galveston were also named to receive the award.

Frank Flegel, executive director of Southern California Goodwill Industries, was keynote speaker at the annual Goodwill Industries Board Banquet on October 8 at the Flagship Hotel in Galveston honoring the three citizens cited for community leadership.

Mrs. Whorton has been active in many civic projects in Galveston. She is Vice President of Programs for the Galveston Historical Foundation and is responsible for co-ordinating the Standing Committee of Membership, Education, Publicity, Public Relations, and Search. She serves on the Steering Committee and the Executive Committee of the Foundation and is a member of The Strand Planning Commission.

In 1973, for the Galveston Historical Foundation and the Galveston County Historical Society, she developed and arranged "Pure Galveston: A Celebration", the event to announce the Strand revolving fund grant from the Moody Foundation.

She is on the Land Use Committee of the League of Women Voters and designed the "Know Your Town" booklet for the League in 1974. This past summer she was appointed by the Mayor and City Council to the Pier 19 Study Committee in evaluating the best long-range use of Pier 19 for the citizens of Galveston.

She is a volunteer of the University of Texas Medical Branch Hospital Auxiliary in the Blood Bank, a member of the Housing Task Force of the Goals for Galveston, the membership chairman of the Galveston Regional Group of the Sierra Club, and on the board of directors of the Lake-side Cemetery Association. Other memberships include: National Trust for Historic Preservation, Texas State Historical Association, National Audubon Society, Galveston Art League, First Presbyterian Church of Galveston, Junior League of Galveston, and Faculty Women's Club of the University of Texas at Medical Branch.

Mrs. Whorton received her bachelor's degree in art from Baylor University and was the former director of the Oklahoma Museum of Art. She served on the Board of Trustees of the Museum, and she and Dr. Whorton have been named honorary life members. She moved to Galveston two years ago after a number of years of residency in Shalburne, Vermont, where she was active in civic affairs and cited as an Outstanding Young Woman of America in 1971. She did graduate work in art at the University of Vermont and has studied with Mario Cooper, National Academy member and President of the American Watercolor Society.

Cain Pledges Fight Against Special Interests

Joe P. Cain predicts that he is going to be a "rare exception" to Texas political rules when he wins election to the powerful Texas Railroad Commission on Nov. 5th. Mr. Cain, the Republican candidate for a six-year term on the commission is running against Democrat Jim Laughlin, an 11-year incumbent. Mr. Cain is the brother of Mrs. Charles D. Stephens of Eagle Lake and Mrs. C. E. (Ed) Johnson of Altair and has visited in this area often.

The Houston trucking company owner says that if he is elected in November, he will be only the second man in Texas history to gain an initial term on the Railroad Commission by election rather than by appointment. All commission members except one have been gubernatorial appointees. He said that no Republican has ever served.

Cain noted that for the first time in Texas political history a Republican candidate has received endorsement for a major state office. The San Antonio Express editorially supports Cain's candidacy for Railroad Commissioner.

Cain said that he believes the people of Texas are "appalled and disgusted" with the large amounts of money that have been contributed to political campaigns by special interests. He is accepting no cash, and no donation larger than \$5.00. Cain says he is prepared to spend \$25,000 to \$30,000 of his own money in running for the office. "It's time to get the professional lawyer-politicians off the commission," he says.

One of Cain's main platform planks calls for changing the name of the Railroad Commission to the Oil, Gas and Public Service Commission to reflect its real functions more accurately. He hopes to make political hay in San Antonio, Austin and Corpus Christi, where residents have watched their utility bills shoot up into the stratosphere. Cain alleges that Langston failed to show any sympathy for the San Antonio, Austin and Lower Colorado area consumers paying doubled rates for natural gas.

Cain is also fulfilling the commission chairman's for taking contributions from oil, natural gas, railroad and trucking and transportation interests supervised by the commission.

Mr. Cain is a native of Austin and a veteran of the U. S. Marine Corps. He is married and has four children. He plans to retire as president of Lake Transport Inc., a state wide motor transport company on January 1st.

Local Citizens Pay Share Of National Debt

What Federal expenditure takes three times as much from Colorado County residents, through the taxes they pay, than that to education? What is it that takes a bigger piece out of their tax dollar than Federal spending for veterans services, revenue sharing, housing and community development, space research and environmental protection, all combined?

The answer is—the interest on the national debt. The interest costs are at a record level, nearly \$80 billion, by virtue of a big boost in the debt ceiling in May. The total debt is now at an astronomical \$495 billion, just under a half trillion.

The increase, requested by the Nixon Administration, was necessary so that the government could borrow money to meet its oncoming obligations. Since \$495 billion is too colossal a sum to grasp, it is broken down for better understanding.

If it had to be paid off all at once and if everyone in the country had to chip in an appropriate share to liquidate it, Colorado County's contribution, based upon local population and income, would amount to \$29,271,000.

The \$30 billion that will be required during this fiscal year is second only to the cost of national defense, the budget shows.

Residents of Colorado County will be paying approximately \$1,774,000 toward these interest charges, in line with their normal share of the overall tax load. Per local family, the average is \$290.

The Federal debt has reached the point of being larger than the combined governmental debts of the rest of the world, according to Congressman H. K. Gross of Iowa. It has risen more in the last five years alone than in the previous sixteen.

Responsibility for the growth is attributed to deficit spending, year after year. The national government has grown so big that it takes \$9,500 every second to keep it going.
