traveling units both from a moving or standing position. The unit may be mounted on a window of the car or may be used as a gun-type unit sighting in any direction. Also the unit has a verification system whereby the officer can compare the speed read on the unit by his actual speedometer setting.

Kelly told the court that delivery may be expected in 30 days. However, a demonstration unit is installed in the road patrol officer's car and will be used until the new unit arrives.

Judge Crank said that it is his understanding that the unit will be placed in the car used by the night patrol officer, deputy Joey Targac.

The unit will be paid for with funds from revenue sharing assignments to Precincts 1 and 4, through agreement by the respective commissioners, since emphasis is being given to traffic control in these areas due to the increasing truck traffic.

SERGEANT APPEARS

Sergeant Gilbert Keil who is in charge of highway patrol operations in Colorado, Austin and Fayette counties, met with the court Monday and stated that the two units in

the cars assigned to this county at the present, are working fine but explained that the capabilities of the units are limited by the fact that the vehicle must be stationary in order for the readings to be made.

"It is getting harder and harder to find vehicles that have devices used to warn others of highway patrol locations," said Keil. He stated, however, that the readings on the units are accurate and that the vigilance on highways in the county has paid off and the arrest rate in this county has doubled over the past year and accidents are down considerably.

Judge Crank pointed out that funds would be available from revenue sharing funds not yet allocated if the court decided to make a purchase. He added that he has received information that the units will go up around \$300 each on November 1st.

This prompted the court to vote to advertise for bids to be opened at 10 a.m. on Oct. 21st on the possible purchase of new units for the past year and accidents are down considerably.

The board also noted to begin monthly meetings at 7:30 in November with the return of Standard Time. The time change on Oct. 27 will not affect class schedules.

A contract was approved

for Mrs. Geraldine Odom to provide transportation for a wheel chair student, Sharon Jones, to and from the school daily for \$3.36 per day. This amount to be paid by the state. Repairs to windows at the senior end of the Administration Building, where leaks are ruining carpets, were approved on a quotation of \$944 from the Colorado Glass Co.

Reports were heard from: Frank Higgins, chairman of a committee to look into the awards program; from Supt. Krivkova on the recent State School Board and Administrative meeting in San Antonio; and from Asst. Supt. Charles DeShazo on the adult education program now underway.

Mr. Higgins reported that all efforts will be made to award letter jackets to seniors as early in the year as possible in order that the students may wear jackets during their senior year as much as possible.

Supt. Krivkova said that the main topic at the meetings he attended were on "accountability" of the entire educational system.

Mr. DeShazo reported to the board that 20 persons began the ABE and GED adult education courses at Eagle Lake Middle School this week. The courses are financed by the state and federal funding programs and there is no cost to the district.

He also revealed plans for seven continuing education programs which will be held if enough interest is shown. The offerings will include: Typing, Conversational Spanish, Self Care and Beauty, Auto Mechanics, Sewing, Art for Fun and Child Care. A minimum of 12 students will be required for each course. Complete details on the program and places for registration will be published in future issues of the Headlight.

ported that school bus prices continue to rise and available a bus that cost \$10,000 last year is priced at \$12,800 this year with a one year delivery date. The board authorized the purchase of a new bus for delivery in October of 1975. The bus will replace one now in service on the Shady Creek route driven by Harry Loper.

The superintendent also reviewed with the board the costs involved in bus transportation noting that costs, including depreciation, run about 22 to 26¢ per mile.

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Local Man Charged In Roy Death

A charge of aggravated assault, a felony, was filed against James Lee Roy, 31, of Eagle Lake, in connection with the death of his wife Gladys Marie Roy, 26, Sept. 26th south of Eagle Lake. Mrs. Roy was dragged down over a bridge on the road. Her husband told officers he had been driving the car when it hit a culvert and flipped in the water, about noon.

The officers found what appeared to be stab wounds in the woman's chest and also some unexplained marks around her neck that they theorized could have been from choking. An autopsy was ordered, and a partial report is still awaited.

The partial report said only that the woman died from suffocation and that the full report to come later would say whether that was from drowning or by being cut off from oxygen in some other manner.

Roy, who first denied having fought with his wife before the accident, admitted later that he had. He said she had been stabbed as they struggled for possession of a knife. He said he put the knife in his pocket after that but that later when he was trying to rescue his wife from the water he became entangled in a fishing line and took the knife out again to cut himself loose. He said he lost the knife in the water after that.

Roy was released from jail under \$5,000 bond.

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CROP Walk Date Nears - Sat., Oct. 26

Eagle Lake students will walk for the hungry people of the world on Saturday, October 26. This project is in keeping with the concern for justice, free expression, and sharing which has typified the young people of today.

Some explanation is needed since the CROP collection in the past has been a door-to-door collection. This year students are invited to participate in a walk. Each participant is to secure sponsors to pay the student an amount of his choosing for each mile walked. Check stations will be set up to verify the distance walked. Students may walk any distance up to ten miles. The route is in town. Dana Wiese is chairman for the committee to secure walkers. Participants are to meet at the park at 2:00 P.M. on Saturday, October 26.

Bob Weishuhn, Pct. 5 J.P. For 30 Yrs, Resigns

Colorado County Commissioners' Court in session on Monday morning accepted with regret the resignation of Judge (Bob) Weishuhn as Justice of the Peace in Precinct 5, effective January 1, 1975.

Judge Weishuhn said in his letter to the court that serious eye problems, just come up in recent months, have forced his resignation.

The resignation was made too late for the County Memorial Service and Lester Johnson to name another candidate to replace Mr. Weishuhn on the November 5th ballot. His name will be listed on the ballot.

He added in his letter that he was making the resignation at this time in recognition of the fact that he has been a Justice of the Peace for 30 years.

The court also approved the re-location of the Altair voting box in Election Precinct 5. On recommendation of Commissioner Bill Stiles the court approved location of voting precinct on Lee Miller premises. In the past the voting had been done at the Stull Creek Lodge. However, due to the ruling of a federal court in defining lines for Congressional districts, this had to be changed.

Under the federal court ruling, residents on the west side of Highway 71 are now in the Columbus voting precinct. All residing on the east side of the highway will vote in the new box on the Miller property.

In other action the court accepted notice from the R. E. (Dick) Haas Pipeline Co. of Corpus Christi that planned to lay a pipeline in county road right of way in the Precinct 5 area. Charlie Mark of New Ulm was on hand to discuss the matter and the court approved the use of markers, etc. The court approved the receipt of the notice after a certificate was read from the state indicating that the company qualifies as a Gas Utility carrier.

An agreement with the Permian Pipeline Utilities was also approved. The agreement sets out that the county is to pay \$275 for widening a pipeline crossing on Highway 71 near the Stafford House due to the fact that the highway is to be widened in that area.

The Permian company through a joint utilities right of way agreement consented to allow use of the company's easement along Highway 71 in the widening and perhaps saved a cost of around \$5,000 to \$20,000 if this right of way would have been purchased at the county's expense, pointed out Judge Crank.
