Republican Candidates Visit Here

GOP Gov. Candidate Granberry For State Sales Tax Reduction

Speaks At Rally Here Sat.

Jim Granberry, Republican candidate for Governor, was a visitor here last Saturday and speaking to an audience of Republicans at the headquarters here, stated that he favored a reduction in the state sales tax as an equitable manner of tax reduction for the citizens of the state. He pointed out that the inflationary economy has caused Texas to spend more for their purchases and as a result have added to the collection of the four per cent state sales tax to the point where some \$500 million dollars have accumulated and are unmarked for expenditure in the state treasury.

He hit at Governor Dolph Briscoe's refusal to call a special session of the state legislature in an effort to determine some method in which this surplus could be used for aid to public schools many of which are in dire straits. "Governor Briscoe broke his promise to the people that there would be no new taxes during his administration. He did this by his refusal to call the special session and to take the leadership to use the surplus for Texas schools," said Granberry. He added that the refusal of the governor to provide this leadership has caused school taxes to go up to support education, which in effect has been labeled "Briscoe tax" increases.

Granberry said that a 20 per cent reduction in the state sales tax would return some \$280 million to the people of Texas and would not be a selective as would a proposal made by Briscoe to eliminate the sales tax on utility bills. He also hit at the inability of the present governor to provide leadership needed to keep pace with these progressive times.

Mr. Granberry expressed great optimism over his chances in the Nov. 5th election, stating that support in many of the larger cities is constantly growing.

He hit at excessive spending on the state level pointing out that under the present administration the budget increased by \$1.4 billion or forty per cent and government on the state level is costing Texans \$9398 per minute as compared to \$602 per minute before Briscoe became governor.

He proposed if elected he would bring grassroots business men to the state capital to advise on methods to reorganize, modernize and to streamline state government.

Also in the party which accompanied Mr. Granberry on his visit to the local headquarters was Paul A. Weiss who is the Republican candidate for the office of U. S. Congressman from the 10th District of Texas. Mr. Weiss is a candidate on the platform of a "Veto-Proof" Congress man stressing that he would be a "representative of all the people with special privileges for none and justice for all."

He stressed that the United States needs to combat inflation as its number one goal and to return this country to a "sound money" basis.

Mr. Granberry, Mr. Weiss and their campaign assistants flew into Eagle Lake airport and were greeted by Sue Briscoe, Republican committee woman, Mrs. Herbert Aull, Joe N. Frazar who is seeking the office of precinct 4 commissioner on the Republican ticket, and Joe H. McCreary.

Those present for the gathering enjoyed coffee and hot lunches in the local headquarters in the former Moss Thomas home before Mr. Granberry's address.
