over twenty-five years of dedicated and brilliant service to the youth and adults of the Eagle Lake and surrounding communities comprising the Rice School District.

Mr. Rosprim graduated from Texas A&M University in 1948 with a degree in Agriculture Education. A few months later he accepted his first teaching position with the Eagle Lake Schools. He founded the vocational agricultural department at the school and developed it into one of the most outstanding in the state, giving guidance and counseling as well as instruction to hundreds of young Future Farmers of America, many of whom are the leaders of today.

When the Rice School District was founded, he continued in his role as vocational agriculture instructor and also as advisor to the Future Farmers of America chapter.

Still, Lewis found time to serve his community in so many ways. He was a past Grand Knight of the Knights of Columbus Council; a committee member in our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church. He was active for many years in the program of the Cub Scout Pack in this community; was an active member of the Eagle Lake Lions Club for many years; and was active in many other community organizations and endeavors.

In the field of agriculture he was constantly an advisor to those who sought to improve methods of production and in family living. He was active in the State Association of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers and was recently recognized for twenty-five years of dedicated and devoted service. In his school he often served in the capacity of class sponsor in addition to his role in the FFA program.

Lewis John Rosprim was born on June 25, 1919 in Ennis, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Rosprim, Sr. After high school he attended Trinity College for a time and then enlisted in the service of his country with the U.S. Air Force during World War II. He served with distinction and was discharged with the rating of Master Sergeant. He continued his interest in the Armed Services after the war and was a member of the National Guard until his retirement in 1962 with the rank of Warrant Officer.

Hunting clubs expect capacity crowds for the first full week-end of goose hunting this week-end.
