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\$20.17 Bbl. Tops For 2nd Crop Rice Here

Thirty-five lots of second crop rice totaling 55,728 cwt. went up for bids at the Eagle Lake office of the American Rice Growers Association of America last Wednesday with the top bid of the day being \$22.45 per cwt. or \$20.17 per barrel and 17 of the 35 lots had bids of \$22 per cwt. or better.

Moore led the bidding for the day and made the top bid for the 10th lot, grown by Fred and Helen Leecher. Second highest bid of \$22.35 per cwt. or \$20.01 per barrel also was by Moore and went for lots of rice grown by R. L. and A. W. Kohlefeld, Wiese Farms (3), and W. J. Brunner.

Most of the second crop rice has been harvested and yields varying widely as to high or less barrels to acre, have seeded Common bermuda on eroded areas which were shaped to control erosion.

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PREPARE NOW FOR FARM CENSUS

Colorado County farmers should begin getting their records in shape for the 20th nationwide Census of Agriculture which will be conducted during the first part of 1975 by the Bureau of Census.

Accurate and detailed records will make it easy for farmers to comply with the federal agency's request. The important thing is to keep good records of your farming operations this year.

Farmers will receive their report forms by mail early next January. These should be completed and returned promptly.

Questions will ask for acreage of cropland harvested, quantity and market value of major crops produced, acres irrigated and means of irrigation, acreage treated with pesticides, lime and other chemicals, acreage fertilized with liquid fertilizer (dry, liquid, gas).

Questions on livestock and poultry will cover the number of each kind on the farm as well as the number sold and the sales value.

Also are requested about farm products produced or marketed under contract, about hired and contract labor and the number of workers and cash wages paid, and about any injuries to workers.

The two types of report forms being prepared include one for farms with sales of \$2,500 or more and a less detailed form for farms with sales of less than \$2,500.

However, regardless of the form a farmer receives, he need answer only his own questions that apply to his operation.

By federal law every report is confidential and will be used only for statistical purposes.

He does settle them though. This was the subject of many of Jeremiah's prophecies. He declared that judgment would only come on his nation. Many of the people rejected his message. They considered him a traitor to his nation. They felt that they would be rescued at the last moment.

The king Jeremiah the opportunity to tell him what God had to say about the situation. Then when Jeremiah told him that the enemy would win and the only escape was to surrender immediately, the king rejected the message. God said the city would be spared if the people would lay down their arms immediately. The leaders did not believe anything God told them so they rejected this message. During the eighteen months of siege that followed, the tragedy proved the message of the prophet to be true.

Abram Sachar recorded what happened in his book: "The History of the Jews." "Jerusalem was... slowly starved into submission. The sufferings of the besieged, prolonged for more than a year and a half, were dreadful. The people perished so fast that it was impossible for the survivors to bury them properly. Corpses decayed in the streets and cellars. Pestilence, endangered by the poisonous stench of the city and by the unwholesome diet forced upon the people, added further horrors to the siege."

Had the prophet been heeded, all of this would have been far different. The sins of a nation lead to judgment. We may feel that America will be exempted from judgment. History and the Scriptures argue against such a view. The choice open to us is to repent of our sins and turn to God. Then we will learn that "righteousness exalts a nation" and strengthens it with the blessings of God.

Two men were discussing a prominent national leader who had been critical of the moral standards of our nation. This man had also questioned the moral judgments of some other leaders. "The man has no right to criticize our government. If he were really a patriot, he would know that we must put America first, right or wrong."

The Bible agrees with the latter view. The prophet Jeremiah found himself in the position of being the critic. He knew that he was loyal to his nation. More importantly, he put his loyalty to God above national loyalty. For years the nation had sinned against God. During the reign of several kings, Jeremiah had tried to call the nation to repentance. The people ignored him. They wanted to do their own thing, even if it meant disobedience to God. They really felt that when the crisis came that God would exempt them from judgment. No criminal ever really believes that he will be caught. We live with the illusion that we will be exempt from the consequences of our own actions. God may not settle all of the accounts immediately.

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
