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Texas Bankers Pledge To Help Win Fight Against Inflation

A resolution was presented on October 23 at the general session 1974 annual conference of the American Bankers Association in Honolulu, Hawaii, pledging America's bankers' support to help win the fight against inflation.

William H. Harrison, president of The First National Bank of Eagle Lake, Mr. Harrison, director, J. R. Thomas and Mrs. Thomas were among those attending the convention.

The resolution reads in part: "We support President Ford's anti-inflation program. We believe it is sound and we are pleased that it avoids the temptation to seek simple, quick-acting solutions for a complex and difficult problem."

"We will observe the guidelines recommended to the Federal Reserve Board by its bankers' advisory group to encourage productive extensions of credit. And we will encourage increased savings by consumers."

"We will vigorously encourage meaningful commitments to the national effort to control inflation through appropriate programs."

"We will accept the burdens involved."

"America's bankers believe that inflation is the most urgent problem facing our nation today. It is eroding confidence in our economic and

FB Electric Demonstration At 3 Area Schools

Farm Bureau will present a program on electric safety for Rice High School at 2:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 18, for Eagle Lake Middle School at 9:30 a.m. Friday, Nov. 22, and for Garwood Elementary School at 1:30 p.m. Friday, Nov. 22, according to school principals.

Most people do not fully understand the life-or-death facts of electricity. The average modern home has 120-volt or 240-volt, 60-cycle alternating household electrical current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Most homes have a number of 15, 20, 30 and 40 ampere circuits, protected with either plug-type fuses or circuit breakers for fire prevention. Fuses or circuit breakers will not prevent electric shock.

Electricity is constantly seeking "ground." Unfortunately the human body can complete the circuit to ground. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current that flows through a 55-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Some of the causes and effects of electric shock to the human body, as well as prevention and protective methods, will be graphically demonstrated by Joe Smetana, Waco, Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau.

CAMPERS FLOCK TO TEXAS

Out-of-state campers flocked to Texas during June, July and August, according to a quarterly report on auto visitors just released by the Texas Highway Department.

The report also cites variations from previous averages which may indicate significant effects of inflation and the energy crisis on the Texas tourism industry.

Camping, which has shown steady increases over the past several years, continued to grow by an additional four per cent in the latest survey. In fact, 37 per cent of summer auto visitors named camping and trailers as their primary accommodations while in the Lone Star State.

Reflecting apparent concern about fuel conservation, the report shows the average tourist trip was 97 miles this summer compared to nearly 1,300 miles last year. In addition, more travel parties cited specific destinations as opposed to regional or unplanned touring trips.

Expenditures per day were down sharply from more generous levels in the spring quarter, but were still ahead of 1973's year round average. The department's summer quarter report is based upon thousands of questionnaires returned by auto travel parties who visited Texas during the peak summer season. They stayed 5.8 days compared to an average of 5.7 days throughout 1973. Tourist party spending was up to \$23.69 per day from last year's average of \$45.18.
