Mr. Seaholm was working with other employees unloading a large generator motor from a truck. A dragline was being used to lift the motor when for some unknown reason the braking mechanism on the dragline slipped and the bucket of the dragline struck Seaholm in the back, knocking him to the ground, face down. The bucket then felt across his lower legs pinning him beneath the heavy piece of equip-

In the accident he received compound fractures of both bones in the left leg and his

right leg was also broken. Gus was brought to Eagle Lake Community Hospital by the Eagle Lake-Volunteer Ambulance Corps and shortly afterward was sent by ambuance to the Herman Hospital in Houston. #### Ischy Given 3 Years On Marijuana Charge

David Phillip Ischy, 20, one of two men in a plane that crashed on Farm to Market Road 2434 in this county Nov. 13th, entered a plea of guilty and waived grand jury indictment on a charge of possession of marijuana in district court in Columbus Dec. 27th and he was assessed three years in the state penitentiary.

Ischy was recently given three years in the penitentiary and an additional ten years of probation on a charge of revocation of probation in a federal court in Austin.

#### County Judge Also Becomes Ex-Officio School Supt.

Newly elected state, district, county and precinct officials will begin new terms of office effective January 1st; and in Colorado County this will mark the end of the county superintendent's office.

County Judge Lester J. Cranek, who was among the county officials re-elected to new four year terms, said that an official "swearing in ceremony" has been scheduled for 9 a.m. this morning, Thurs., January 2nd in the county courtroom in the courthouse

Judge Cranek - will also assume the office of Ex-officio county school superintendent with the abolishment of the county superintendent's office which has been filled since Jan. of 1959 by Herbert A. Schroeder, Sr.

Judge Cranek will receive additional pay of \$2660 annually for handling the affairs of the county superintendent's office. The county board comprised of five members, one from each of the commissioners' precincts and one member at large, will continue to function as in the past. Business for the county school board will now be handled through the County Judge's

Allen, has filled the District Clerk's office since February. Rafael Veselka will take over the office of Precinct 2 Commissioner in the Weimar area succeeding the veteran A. J. Kainer in that office. Mr. Kainer elected to retire at the end of the 1974 year after many years of illustrious service to his precinct and to

(Bill) Stiles, Jr., of Eagle Lake; County Judge Cranek; CountyClerk Lester Schneider; County Treasurer Mrs. Martha Bongen; Justices of the Peace M. Jones in Eagle Lake Precinct 8; W. A. Hefner in Garwood Precinct 2; Richard C. Schmidt in Columbus Precinct 1; Francis J. Truchard in North Columbus Precinct 6; Florenz Weishuhn, Jr. in Freisburg Precinct 5: Chester A, Walker in Oakland area Precinct 3; Joe Kaye in Weimar Precinct 4; and Dittman Harrison in Alleyton Precinct 7.

## The charges were filed in 1.8 Million Rice Acreage **Allotment Set For 1975**

Decrease Of 15% In Light Of Large 1974 Carryover

Agriculture announced at the ast hours of the 1974 year Tuesday, that the 1975 rice . acreage allotment in the U.S. be 1,8 million acres, 15 per cent below the acreage allotted for the 1974 crop.

The acreage allotment was reduced despite the fact that there has been a worldwide decline in production of rice and other key feed grains. The 1974 rice crop in the Inited States, however, was a

record one. The acreage allotment for the year was 2.1 million acres however producers were permitted to plant acreage in addition to their regular allotment without support and without penalty on he production from this excess acreage. It has been estimated that around 2,4 mil-

lion acres were planted with

most of the acreage in excess

of allotments being planted in

Arkansas and Mississippi. Record production in the United States resulted and because of this a surplus of rice has been accumulated and prices offered for the 1974 rice fell below expectations. Nonetheless, those prices were almost double the aver-

Under existing laws governng rice production in the U. S., secretary of agriculture had until midnight Dec. 31st to establish an acreage allotment which will provide which, when sidded to the previous year's carryover, will meet the domestic and-foreign needs and an allowance. for carryover.

The department determined that the 1,802,916 acre allotment for 1975 will meet that requirement.

The secretary announced a 1.6 million acre allotment for the 1974 crop in October of 1973 but in January of 1974
