## Senior Citizen Program Meet

Thurs., Jan. 9

A meeting will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 9 to discuss the Christmas program. The program is a project to provide services to Colorado County's senior citizens. Representatives of each community will be asked to attend the organization meeting.

The new service is being introduced under the joint sponsorship of Colorado County, the Agricultural Extension Service and the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC).

County Extension Agent Dorothy Schomburg, program director, said the purpose of the service is to reach individuals 60 years of age and older who are alone, need help of any kind and won't ask for it.

"Our first task is to make a master list of all citizens over 60 and determine their needs," she said.

A lot of people are going to have to pitch in and help. "The services can be helpful," she said, "but they must meet the needs of the people. Others may help by volunteering their services to canvass the community and report what the needs are."

She said offices will be established in Columbus, Weimar and Eagle Lake where the elderly can go to find out what services are available to them.

and apply two additional inches of water each day. Set a can in the sprinkler pattern to determine water applied.

The water will carry the chemical into the root zone and will also act as a water seal and prevent chemical loss. There is a two week waiting period prior to planting. The preferred time for treatment would be in the spring as soon as the soil temperature reaches 55 degrees F.

It is also suggested that the soil be worked to a depth of six to ten inches with a rototiller to improve movement of the chemical.

## REFLECTIONS ON Sunday School Lesson

(Matthew 5:17-20, 22-24; 18:33-34)

"Modern thinkers have rejected all firm standards of right and wrong. Most people feel they have a perfect right to do anything they want to do. We simply do not want to have any rules that would limit our freedom." When that statement was written a few years ago, most writers were "encouraging everyone to do that which was right in their own eyes." Now the backlash of the concept is coming as people recognize that they are not emotionally equipped to serve as gods.

Jesus, who taught that people needed the security of well established standards, made it clear that the spirit of obedience to the rules is the obedience itself. Some people probably hoped that he would do away with the strict interpretation that the teachers had given to the Old Testament laws. He rejected some of the interpretations that had been made, but he also established the permanence of the law. He stated that he would do away with the heavens and earth to pass away, but God's laws were eternal. Obedience to the law alone is not enough. Jesus taught that our standing before God depends on God's making us righteous. The simple keeping of the rules does not make us righteous. It works the other way. Meaningful obedience becomes possible only when God empowers it. When one is rightly related to God, then they can build an enduring life on the teachings of Jesus.

Lives must be built on the teachings of Jesus and upon God's laws. Jesus said that wise men build their lives on this permanent foundation. Without firm objective standards a man's life is as unstable as a house built on sand. Just as a house falls during a flood, a life without standards falls.

The teaching of Jesus was authoritative. He claimed the authority of God for what he was saying. He left his hearers sensing that God's authority was evident in the words he spoke. They even stated that he spoke with authority. His teachings were largely based on the Old Testament scriptures and his interpretation of them.

Jesus taught simply. There was no confusion in what he meant. Simple illustrations made his meanings clear. He never used the tight knot logic of the Greeks. Instead, he spoke simply so anyone could understand and apply what he said to life's daily issues. Because of this, there is no need for confusion in standards for living. God has given them and we should apply them.

## Nematodes Cause Garden Failures

Nematodes and soil diseases represent two of the major factors causing many home gardens to fail.

In the past, control has been achieved with granular DDT or methyl bromide. The use of granules produced little result.

Recent results show that Vapam is effective in the control of nematodes and soil diseases.

Vapam is used at the rate of one gallon per 500 square feet and can be applied with a hose-on sprayer.

After application, apply three to four inches of water to move the chemical into the root zone. For the next two weeks, keep the soil extremely damp to use and has certain side effects which make it questionable in the family garden. It may give best results, but will also kill shrubs and trees whose roots extend into the treated area.
