**FFA-TRAIL RIDE FROM EL TO ALTAIR SLATED FEB. 15**

Plans are being completed for the annual Trail Ride to be held preceding the Rice High School Future Farmers of America Show and Sale on Saturday, Feb. 15th.  
Alvin Kohlfeldt of the Eagle Lake Noon Lions Club and Richard Bryant of the Eagle Lake Evening Lions Club will serve as chairmen of the 1975 ride which will be made this year from Eagle Lake to the Rice High School at Altair. In years past the ride has been made from Altair to Garwood but was changed this year since the show and sale will be held in the new Rice FFA Show Barn instead of at the Garwood location.  
The 1975 ride will leave from the area of the roadside park on Highway 90A west of the city at 8:00 a.m. and will arrive at the Rice High School west of Altair at around 11:30 a.m.  
A trail ride sweetheart contest will be held during the ride and the winner of the competition will be announced at the show and sale at 1:00 p.m. All high school girls interested in participating in the contest should sign up at the sound truck before 8 a.m. on the day of the ride.  
Entries in the contest must be of ages 15 through 18 and they must ride in the trail ride and will be judged on appearance and riding ability.  
The trail ride bosses, Mr. Kohlfeldt and Mr. Bryant, remind riders that the new route will follow Highway 90A for its entire route and will cross the Colorado river bridge at Altair, have severe safety precautions need to be exercised by all riders and by those viewing the ride.  
The trail bosses noted especially that NO persons will be allowed to ride alongside the riders in cars or trucks thereby blocking traffic and creating a traffic hazard for the riders.  
"Please plan to obey all instructions or you will be asked to leave the ride," said the trail bosses.
