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Citizens Comm. Approves City Sewer Project

The seven member Citizens Advisory Committee recommended that the city of Eagle Lake proceed with plans for application for funds under the Housing and Urban Development program (HUD) Monday night after no objection to this project was voiced at a public hearing in the council room of the Municipal Building.

Notice had been given of the public meeting at 5:30 p.m., and the only ones to appear for the meeting, in addition to the committee members, were Editor Fred R. Frka, Mayor Elmer Struss and Councilman Roy Dean Van Nort and Gene Baker.

The application for the funds under the program was signed by Mayor Struss Tuesday and the application delivered to the HUD headquarters in Houston prior to the March 1st deadline set by HUD for initial applications for the fully-funded grant program.

The council proposes and it was the committee's recommendation that the application be made for funds for extending sewer facilities to the only portion of the city not serviced at this time - in an area bounded by Hubbard-Ferry Rd., Austin Rd. and West Main Street. Engineers have estimated costs of the program at from \$65,000 to \$87,000.

Mayor Struss Monday night told the committee to consider other projects that might be included in a three-year plan and to make recommendations on these projects as long as they conform to the guidelines for the community's consideration. He said that the initial application by this city is expected to be among the first of the outstanding initial applications and the city stands a good chance for an early approval of the project.

City Manager T. L. Smith who is the director of Community Development for the city of Eagle Lake, said that the city should have word by mid-year on whether or not the application has been approved.
