with the possibility that the building will be used for a possible emergency hospital, for a possible fire department sub-station, or for some other purpose than sponsorship of the Garwood Lions Club.

In the discussion that followed it was pointed out that policies of the Rice Board would prohibit use of the facility by a non-school affiliated organization unless it were given a lease on a long term.

Board members Dale Hunt and Anthony Kallina, who were appointed to serve with eight other Garwood residents to consider demolishing of the old building, reviewed the study made by the committee and said that the committee decided that the building should be demolished.

Serving on the committee with Hunt and Kallina and making recommendations to demolish the building were: Mrs. Irene Seifert, Mrs. Ben Pavlu, Mrs. Walter Braden, Frederick Leopold, Frederick Priesmeyer, William N. Lehner, Walter Gold and Ralph Stiles.

Board president Dr. Ray Thomas and board members expressed appreciation to Mr. Priesmeyer for his interest and enthusiasm about the matter.

After the discussion, the tax revenues for the year were \$61,000 over anticipated revenues - but that some expenditures, especially in utilities and maintenance, are running above expectations, also, he commented that it would be to the benefit of the district to have the school surplus in the light of the possible school legislation.

He also suggested that the board might want to delay a decision on setting school location in coming weeks.

The first quarter will be for 62 days, from Aug. 19 through Nov. 12th. Teacher workshops are scheduled Nov. 13-14; the second quarter will be for 58 days beginning Nov. 17 through Feb. 20th. Another teacher workshop is scheduled Feb. 24; the third quarter of 60 days will begin Feb. 25th and continue through May 24th. Teacher workshops are scheduled May 25-26.

No classes are scheduled in the district in the fourth quarter.

Holidays for the year will be for Labor Day, Sept. 1; Nov. 27-28 for Thanksgiving; Dec. 22-Jan. 2 for Christmas and New Year's; on Feb. 23rd; April 15-19 for Easter.

"We should spend funds to maintain the buildings which we use, rather than spend tax money on a project that has no foreseeable use in the future," said Hunt. He and Kallina and members of the committee believe the building has sentimental influence, especially on those who attended the school, but added that in the best interest of the district its removal would be a "step forward in keeping with a trend in the past in the Garwood District."

The motion to remove the building was made by Hunt and seconded by Kallina and the motion to accept the bid to demolish the building was passed.

During the discussion with Mr. Priesmeyer, who attended Monday night's meeting, the board was assured by the superintendent and the current principal John Mader that the school has adequate space for classrooms, now and for perhaps eventual inclusion of students from Nada parochial school, and for storage, for recreation and physical fitness programs for the youth attending grade 8 in the Garwood Elementary school.

Mr. Priesmeyer urged the board to seek input from more citizens in the district.

He also said that the information he has is that this position does not reside in this county, but in Wharton County.

"My chief opposition," said Leyendecker, "is that I did not want to create a position or positions that would be funded by the county's taxpayers. One position is established, rarely does it ever become abolished."

He said that Judge Schrader has suggested that the road and said the county could save money if it connected with County road 228 near Lake Sheridan.

Judge Lester Cranek pointed out that the commissioners' court has authority to appoint a three-member road jury and it would be the duty of the road commissioners with help of the county engineer and the county surveyor which the road lies, to develop the most feasible routing.

Mr. Veselka reminded that the plans were made on the acceptance of a \$50,000 wide road right-of-way easement, northeast of Lake Sheridan; as an extension of Road 228 which runs from Rusk to Wharton.

The court approved the petition and will appoint a jury to develop the road.

E. H. Moore, who campaigned for the office of county judge last year, was at the meeting. He said that he spoke out against bureaucracy commenting that "we need to stay at home and tend to our own problems. We need to hit the bullet and tighten our belts," he added as recommended Stiles and Leyendecker on their stand.

After several hours of discussion, a motion was made by Precinct one Commissioner Walter Henneke that the request for inclusion of the Rice district in the budget be referred to the House Bill committee.

Mr. Moore, but with the support of the commissioners, a juvenile probation officer that might be hired to serve the 25th district, was recommended and passed legislatively on the number of cases in each of the four counties, also that the maximum salary be set at \$400 per month for the three members of the county board, but that no minimum salary be established.

The commissioners voted to accept the county's request that the Rice district be included in the budget.
