Present Entertaining Skit, Style Show

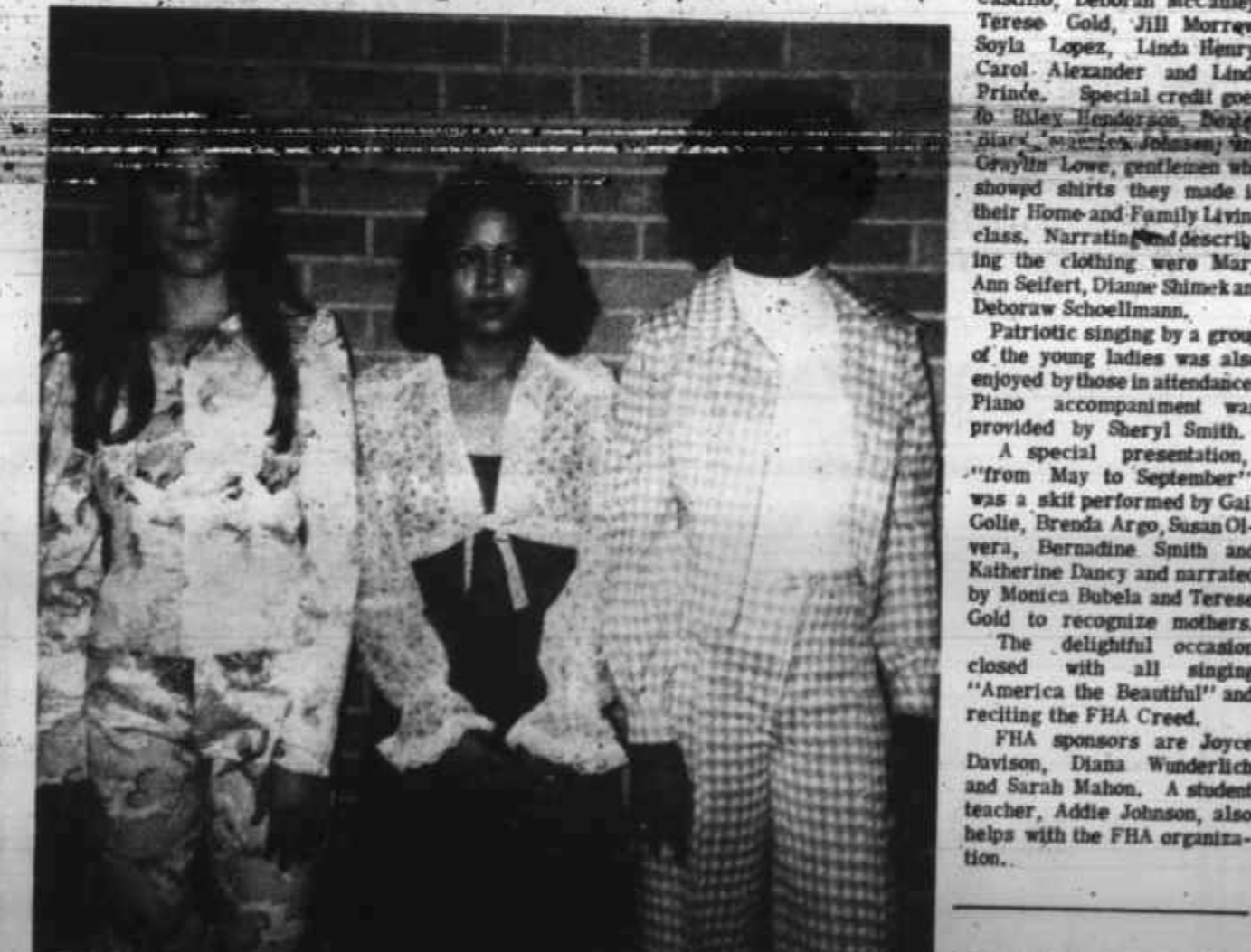

COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMITTEE Hosted Regional Meet APR. 9

15 Counties Represented

The Colorado County Historical Survey Committee hosted the Regional Meeting of the Texas Historical Commission at St. John's Episcopal Parish Hall in Columbus on Wednesday, April 9. Historical Committees from fifteen counties were represented by more than sixty members. Two members of the Board of Directors of the Texas Historical Foundation, Mrs. R. F. Bus of Columbus and Robert Key of Marshall, were also in attendance. Members of the Colorado County Commissioners Court were luncheon guests.

The program was under the direction of Mrs. Deolce Parsons, Director of Research, Texas Historical Commission, and Bob Watson, Director of Programs, Texas Historical Commission.

Mrs. Parsons discussed the sources of materials available for the documentation of historical markers and genealogical research. She reminded participants that Texas public land records are unique. Records prior to 1846 are available in the Land Office, Austin. In other states similar records are available from National Archives, Washington, D.C. Other sources suggested for use were census records, Texas Almanac, military records, and records filed in the county clerk's office. Even in some instances where a court house has been destroyed, fire, citizens have cooperated by bringing records in order that copies might be made. Mrs. Parsons discussed an example of research and documentation for a historical marker.

Mr. Watson described the County Records Inventory Project which is a statewide survey of courthouse records both in offices and in storage. The work is done by students in history, government, and archives classes and seminars from colleges and universities in Texas. A film was used to show how the program operates at the Texas State University, Denton. This work is being done to provide information for the National Historical Archives.

RAIDERS LOOK FOR FIRST WIN IN WHARTON THURS.

7th Inning Error Downfall In Edna Tilt Fri.

The Rice Raiders baseball team dropped the final three games of the first round of West Zone District 13AAA play during the past week, ending the round with a 0-3 record.

Coach Wm Hollis' nine will open the second round of play today, Thursday, April 17 in Wharton with the game due to begin at 7:00 p.m. West Zone District 13AAA play Tuesday, April 22, the Raiders host Youkum in a game at 4:00 p.m.

On Tuesday of last week the Raiders went to Columbia and dropped a 6 to 1 decision to the Roughnecks.

The Raiders lost a heartbreaker to the Edna Cowboys due to a three run error in the top of the seventh; and Tuesday in Seabury they lost a 3 to 0 decision.

Rice's lone tally in West Columbia came in the first on a double by Ricky Chism and a single by Arthur Yanez. Columbia tallied 3 in the third and 3 in the fifth.

Rice left eleven men stranded on the bases. In addition to hits by Chism and Yanez, Steve Grammer, Darrell Dancy, Jeff Wied and Mano Graham hit safely. Wied and Yanez were the pitchers for Rice.

Eight errors including the costly one in the seventh, blew the Raiders' chance to chalk up their first win of the season last Friday. Rice held a 3 to 1 lead in the last of the seventh and had two out in the eighth when the error came. The error came on a double by Wied; a sacrifice by Donna Perry and a double by Graham and an error in centerfield.

Yanez, Wied and Graham pitched for the Raiders. Wied had a pair of hits for Rice.

In Seabury Tuesday night the Raiders lacked base runners and came up on the short end of a 3 to 0 district contest.

Grammer, Perry and Dancy were the only Raiders to get hits. Sweeney scored one in the second and led down the game with two in the fifth behind some good pitching. Yanez pitched for the Raiders and gave up six hits, walked three and struck out three.

Sanchez Sets RHS Pole Vault Record

The final competition of the District 13AAA Spring meet will be held this Friday in Allen when the boys compete in track and field events.

The final competition of this week, tennis in Wharton, took place at Brazosport.

400 Yard Relay: Clayton Smith, Dwight Rhodes, Bobby Turner, Charles Powell; 120 Yard High Hurdles: Tony Black, Jeff Wagner, Terry Teague; 100 Yard Dash: Charles Powell, Sammy Flowers, Clayton Smith.

The Raiders, coached by David Cardona, scored a total of 13 points in the meet including a second place finish in the pole vault.

Joe Sanchez in the pole vault cleared 13 feet setting a new Rice High School record. It is the third time this season that he has bettered the school mark.

Other final events were: 100 Yard Dash: Tony Black, fourth in the 180 yard intermediate hurdles in 41.5, also a new RHS record; James Fraser, fifth in the high jump with 5' 10"; Bobby Turner was sixth in the high jump clearing 5' 8"; and Sanchez also placed sixth in the 800 yard run in the time of 2:07.

St. Thomas won the meet with 87 points; Friendswood was second with 73; Seabury third with 70 and Wharton fourth with 65. Rice finished in sixth spot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Instruction Note: Place an X in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

NO. 1 ☒ FOR ☐ AGAINST

The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

No. 2 ☒ FOR ☐ AGAINST

The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

AMENDMENT 1

If this fails, the increased teacher retirement benefits recently enacted by the Legislature for teachers who retired before Sept. 1, 1973, will stop immediately. If it is approved, the way would be cleared for possible future improvements in benefits for teachers yet to retire.

AMENDMENT 2

The present \$4,800 per year salary of legislators is unrealistic in today's economy. Amendment 2 will cost approximately 7¢ per person a year to implement. Invest in State government!
