fortieth consecutive year. He estimated that Lone Star has at this time some 140 employees in this county with an annual payroll of around \$2 million. He estimated that the firm pays about 40% of the total of \$10,000 paid annually in county and school taxes by aggregate companies operating in the area at this time.

He praised the transportation facilities available in this area, both rail and truck, and pointed out that the company has a policy to never overload a truck. He said that the B. R. Taylor company doing most of the hauling from the new Blue Roan Bend plant is considered as one of the best truck operators in the state.

Mr. Seay showed slides and discussed the operations at the Blue Roan Bend plant, south of Eagle Lake. He described the plant as one of the most modern in the nation, using a one of a kind three bucket dredge with capabilities of removing sand and gravel from as deep as 100 feet. He estimated that the company has adequate holdings under lease in the Blue Roan Bend for an estimated thirty years of operation.

Also discussed were the operations at the Eagle Lake plant where sandblasting sand is the primary product. This sand is used over much of the nation and is preferred in the type of work for which it is designed. Much of the sand

used in the sandblasting plant was stored as a by-product from previous sand and gravel operations in the area just south of this city.

Mrs. Emily Stiles, president of the Chamber extended thanks to Mr. Seay and his company for their contributions to the area's economy.

In the business session before Mr. Seay's talk, a report was given that twelve members attended an eight hour short course on developing an industrial foundation, presented by representatives of Central Power and Light.

non-school months.

FUTURE PLANNING The superintendent and the board members discussed the possibility of setting up a long-range planning program for the Rice District. Supt. Krivacka said that the board should consider setting up a planning council comprised of board members, administration and private citizens to map out long-range plans and objectives. He also recommended that a board committee consider revision and updating of the district's book of policies; and that a faculty committee be formed to study weaknesses that were noted in the district during a recent evaluation made by the faculty members.

The superintendent pointed out that the district is in its seventh year of consolidation and the Rice High School is completing its fifth year. "Unity among the communities of the district was one of the key objectives and this has been accomplished and a pleasant relationship now exists," said Mr. Krivacka.

He also stated that the district has gained respect and stature over the state; has established a good professional staff of outstanding personnel; and the curriculum has been expanded in the vocational fields in five areas as permitted by the state board of education; the entire curriculum has been broadened, and a broad extra-curriculum program has been achieved.

The board is expected to consider further the suggestions made by the superintendent at the next meeting on May 12th.

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
