Rotary Has Fine Program On First Aid

Eagle Lake Rotarians and guests enjoyed a fine program on first aid and the valuable services offered by the local Emergency Unit last Wednesday when Herman Novak of El Campo was the guest speaker.

Mr. Novak is employed by the city of El Campo as a fireman and head of the emergency vehicle operations for that city. He has conducted many training classes here for the local Emergency Unit volunteers and for others.

Mr. Novak commented that "An emergency vehicle is a junkie without trained personnel to man the equipment and to render first aid." He praised the local volunteers commenting that "you're lucky to have such a wonderful and dedicated group of trained volunteers."

He told the Rotarians and guests that first aid is often the first step in the treatment of an injury and that the trained emergency volunteers arrive on the scene. He assisted at the scene during the ABC's of first aid as Always, Breathing and Circulation.

These three functions must be kept going by the emergency volunteer until such time as a physician can be secured," said Novak. He commented that two minutes after breathing stops for whatever reason may be, the heart begins to fail and in six to seven minutes brain damage starts to take place.

He said that the first aider uses whatever he has on his person; plus vital, to keep these three vital functions going.

Commenting on the volunteers who recently completed the Emergency Medical Technicians' course here, "State inspectors said that this group was one of the best trained ever checked and the grades made by the group placed them below only one group of said state inspectors."

Dr. R. R. Thomas, who assisted in instructing the group in the EMT course, had words of praise for Mr. Novak who devotes countless hours of his time voluntarily to conduct such courses.

Dr. Thomas said that the community should be proud indeed of their emergency volunteers who are some of the best trained and most capable volunteer personnel in the state.

Mr. Novak was introduced by Andy Anderson, the program chairman for the day.

Truck Stuck On RR Track At Columbus Barely Misses Collision

A large truck and trailer loaded with foreign make automobiles (Volkwagens) narrowly missed being hit by a freight train in Columbus early Tuesday morning and only the quick work of the Volkswagens from being scattered over the north side of Columbus.

At 5:45 a.m. the sheriff's office received word that a large truck which had a load too tall for the underpass on Highway 71, tried to go around the underpass and other street (Austin Street) but the long truck struck the high approaches at that point.

Deputy Joey Targac was unable to contact the railroad tower at Glendon to inform them of the truck on the tracks, so he headed for Glendon to see and help the truck. A freight train was east toward the intersection. He used flashing lights on the car to warn the engineers of "impending danger" and the train was slowed down and stopped before reaching the truck on the Austin Street intersection.

A wrecker from Blackie's Wrecker Service freed the vehicle from the crossing without damage.

P. G. Woodhouse's "The Pilot That Thickened" is like too small a serving of lemon meringue pie: you want more. If you are already a fan of Woodhouse, you will be acquainted with his wit and the singular, unconventional twists of fate he gives to his stories.

This one concerns the almost-unrequited love of Sandy, an American girl, for Monty, her English boss who is employed at a Mr. Llewellyn's Hollywood Studio. Monty's fiancée is in England, absence has evidently made his heart grow fonder for this thought, unattractive girl he has left at home since he remains completely blind to the girl's existence.

Where the plot thickens, interweaving with Sandy's love affair is a lot of evocative, almost-journalistic planning to steal the wealthy Mrs. Llewellyn's pearl necklace.

Pure froth, of course, yet the characters are thoroughly entertaining. Here is a novel that is fun to read.
