## Bell Symbol Of Mental Health Fund Campaign

"This bell shall ring out  
hope for the mentally ill and  
victory over mental illness."  
These words are inscribed  
on the Mental Health Fund  
symbol of the Mental Health  
Association.



During May, a neighbor will  
ringing your doorbell, to  
ask you to support mental  
health. Mrs. Becky Marzalla  
of Eagle Lake will lead the  
campaign in Eagle Lake.

The bell symbol represents  
an actual bell, which was cast  
in 1953 from chains and hand-  
cuffs and other metal  
restraints formerly used to  
bind mental patients.

Within the symbol, there is  
also a group of people stand-  
ing with hands joined, forming  
an unbroken circle around the  
bell.

The circle of people sug-  
gests the power of different  
individuals to change condi-  
tions. The people of Eagle  
Lake will do just that when  
they unite in support on behalf  
of the mentally ill during May.

The 24th annual outdoor art show in Columbus this year will be a popular one, says Mrs. H. T. Young, Jr., president. If advance registrations are any indication, so far, 67 people have signed up for space on the courthouse square, which includes an art club of 30 members from Austin.

The show is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, May 17 and 18. Registrations will also be taken the opening morning, May 17, from 9 to 10:30 a.m. A total of almost \$200 in cash prizes is being offered in three groups, and ribbons will be awarded in the children's division.

Top prize will be \$75 in the professional division, \$25 for second and \$25 for third. In the non-professional group, first prize will be \$25; second, \$15; and third, \$10. Entry fee is \$1 per picture in the non-professional group; \$1.50 per painting in professional and the historical group; and \$5 per painting in the children's division. The club will ask a 10% commission on all sales. Pre-registration is open until May 15.
