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Bell Symbol Of Mental Health Fund Campaign

"This bell shall ring out
hope for the mentally ill and
victory over mental illness."
These words are inscribed
on the Mental Health Bell,
the symbol of the Mental Health
Association.

During May, a neighbor will
be ringing your doorbell, to
ask you to support mental
health. Mrs. Becky Moralla
of Eagle Lake will lead the
campaign in Eagle Lake.

The bell symbol represents
an actual bell, which was cast
in 1953 from chains and hand-
cuffs and other metal
restraints formerly used to
bind mental patients.

Within the symbol, there is
also a group of people stand-
ing with hands joined, forming
an unbroken circle around the
bell.

The circle of people sug-
gests the power of different
individuals to change condi-
tions. The people of Eagle
Lake will do just that when
they unite in support on behalf
of the mentally ill during May,
Mental Health Month.
