## Mansfield Historical Marker Unveiled



Representatives of the three major cities and the county are due to meet with representatives of Taylor Trucking Co. for a discussion on the operation of the sanitary landfill between Alair and Columbus in the county courthouse in Columbus at 2:00 p.m. this Thursday, May 22nd.

At a recent meeting of the county and city officials, B. H. Taylor presented figures indicating that the county had lost \$100,000 in the operation of the sanitary landfill during the past 15 months. At the time the company obtained approval for installation of the sanitary landfill, the backing of the three incorporated cities, Taylor agreed to take trash and garbage from the three towns, as well as from other areas of the county, without charge.

At the meeting in April, the county asked for a subsidy of \$7,000 per month from the cities and county to offset some of his losses in operation of the landfill.

Originally the county agreed only to the dumping of construction materials and debris and later agreed to permit Mr. Taylor to haul debris from shopping centers to supplement his income and increase loads in his trucks on their return trip to Eagle Lake area after hauling sand and gravel from this county to Houston.

Eagle Lake and Columbus, after state and federal regulations prevented burning trash, abandoned their former dumps and have been using the landfill exclusively. Weimer does a dump-and-leave business.

Following the April meeting, representatives of the incorporated cities and county were to check with their respective city and county engineers to answer to Mr. Taylor's proposal and are due to report these findings at the meeting Thursday.
