Pickle Hits at Failure of Emerg. Farm Act

I was very disappointed that the House failed to override the President's veto of the Emergency Farm Act of 1975 this week.

The President's refusal to accept this compromise measure which would have raised target prices on wheat, cotton and corn to realistic levels, is evidence that this Administration continues to turn its back on the farmer.

I really believe the Administration is very misleading when it vetoed this legislation on "economic" grounds. It is a disservice to the farmer and the economy and give much short to the very vital food and fiber producers. It is obvious that the farmer and rancher have been placed at the bottom of the barrel in the priority list behind social services, energy, transportation and defense. This is ironic because food production is inevitably linked to all other factors in our economic life. We have no greater earner in foreign exchange, totalling more than \$20 billion last year.

I am afraid that the President was the victim of bad advice on his veto action. I believe that he listened to his Secretary of Agriculture, Dr. Earl Buttz. As soon as we get Buttz to boot out, the better off the farmer will be.
