### Spike Buck Study At Tait Ranch

David Reed, biologist for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, stationed in Matagorda County, told the Rotarians of progress being made and objectives of a spike buck study which is currently underway in this county and also on the introduction of a new game bird, the ring-necked pheasant in the Gulf Coast area.

He told the Rotarians and guests last Wednesday that biologists are currently in the process of trapping wild turkeys, with lights and nets, on the Tait Ranch.

He said that the study is in an effort to collect a study on spike buck traits among deer in this county.

The biologist said that the deer are being marked with a freeze brand which kills the pigmentation of the skin but does not hurt the animal. The result is that the number freeze brand on the animal continues to enlarge as the animal grows and is easily visible due to the white marking caused by stopping coloration of the skin.

He said that to date last Wednesday, seventeen deer had been marked on the Tait Ranch.

Hunters will be asked not to kill the marked bucks in order that biologists may study the time required for the bucks to develop horns and factors relative to the size of the horns to age and other data.

The ring-necked pheasants were introduced in the Matagorda area in 1971 and the biologists report that the birds have made excellent progress and predicted that a short hunting season may be coming up on this new game bird.

That biologists said that the pheasants are being released and the wild birds seen to be prospering.

He added that the pheasant was brought to the Matagorda area due to the similarity of the California area from which the birds were brought. He said that pheasants like the open range and rice field areas that abound in the Gulf Coast county.

In answer to a question, the biologist admitted that the pheasant would compete with the quail for food, but pointed out that the quail look for cover while the pheasant likes open areas. Further, he added that due to constant clearing of the land processes the cover for quail has been diminishing and the pheasant was introduced in hopes of restoring some hunting since the pheasant does about more in the open areas.

Mr. Reed was introduced by Sam Center, state Parks and Wildlife Game Warden in this area. Henry Brune was program chairman and he introduced the speaker while standing Bellville High School.
